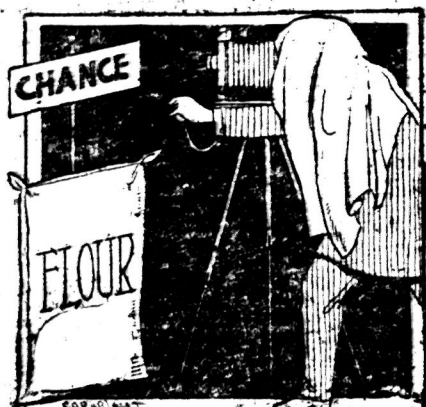

Lots of Candidates Wrote

The Department of Education has issued a statement in regard to the examinations of candidates for entrance to the Model and Normal Schools, to the faculties and education and for pass and honor matriculation, which in part is as follows: "There were in all about 8,900 candidates for these examinations, which is about 500 in advance of 1908. In addition to the regular staff of ten in the registrar's branch of the department this work has necessitated the employment of thirty-five examiners-in-chief, who will set the papers and read the appeals; two hundred and twenty associate examiners, who, with the examiners-in-chief, read the answers, and over thirty temporary clerks, who attend to the entering, numbering and distributing of the answer papers and the checking and recording of marks.

Every possible precaution is taken to insure that these examinations serve the purposes for which they are intended. The question papers are prepared by boards of carefully selected examiners, and are distributed to the various centres of examination with the greatest care and secrecy. All examinations are conducted identically as far as is possible; and great care is exercised in the handling of the answer papers.

This year for the first time in cases where the margin of failure is comparatively small the papers are re-read by the examiner-in-chief. Finally the reports of the teachers as to the standing of their pupils are considered, and in deserving cases allowances are made by the revising board. This board consists of examiners-in-chief, who also recommend for passing such candidates whose aggregate of marks entitles them to special consideration.

This careful scheme has been adopted because of the delay in reading the appeals which under the old system has been productive of much uneasiness to candidates. The list of successful candidates will likely come out before the middle of August.
