The Department of Education has issued a statement in regard to the examinations of candidates for entrance to the Model and Normal Schools, to the faculties and education and for pass and honor matriculation, which in part is as follows:

This year for the first time in cases where the margin of failure is comparatively small the papers chief. Finally the reports of the teachers as to the standing of their pupils are considered, and in deserving cases allowances are made by the revising board. This board consists of examiners-in-chief, who also recommend for passing such candidates whose aggregate of marks entitles them to special consideration.
