VICTORIA DAY IN NANTICOKE

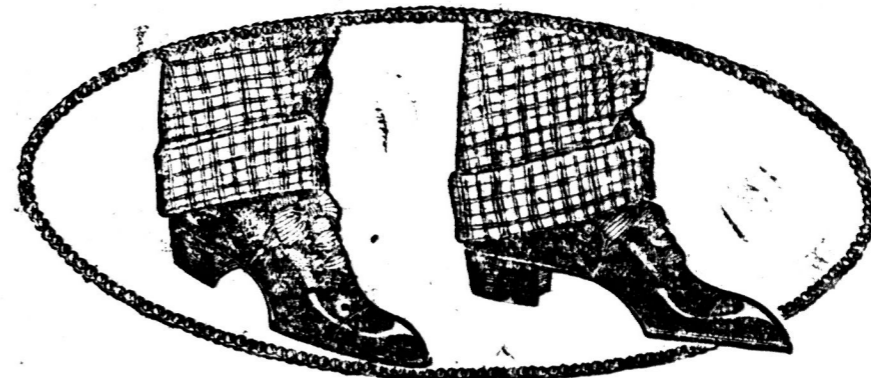
