Died While On A Visit

The death of Mrs. H. G. Watson, of Detroit, who was on a visit to her sister-in-law, Mrs. John Harvey, Walpole township, occurred Monday night under very sad circumstances. She attended the Methodist church here Sunday morning with Mr. and Mrs. Harvey, apparently in excellent health. On Monday afternoon while helping at some baking she suddenly fell to the floor in an unconscious state. Mr. Harvey was in the garden a short distance from the house and was told of what had happened by her little son. Medical aid was immediately summoned but the unfortunate woman was past medical assistance and passed away during the night never having regained consciousness. A stroke, probably caused by a tumor on the brain, was the cause of death.

Mrs. Watson, who is a boiler inspector, was telegraphed for at 10 o'clock and arrived at his wife's bedside shortly before she died. Deceased was about 33 years of age and had been married ten years. She leaves no family.

After a short service conducted here by Rev. H. J. Harnwell the remains were taken to Hagersville this morning and conveyed via the Michigan Central to Detroit for interment.

Those who came here from Detroit were the deceased's mother, Mrs. Rust; Mrs. Fred Hawk and Miss Minnie Miller, sisters, and Mr. John Miller, brother. The floral tributes were very beautiful including a pillow of roses and carnations from the grief-stricken husband.

Woodhouse Resident Dead

After an illness lasting about six weeks Thos. D. W. Lundy passed away at his home near Marlburg on Thursday morning last, having never recovered from the effects of a paralytic stroke. Deceased, who was 80 years old, was born in one of the eastern States. When a young lad he came to Canada with his parents settling in Pelham township, in the county of Welland, where he remained until after his marriage to Mrs. Lundy whose maiden name was Sarah E. Leggett. In 1873 they came to Woodhouse where he had resided ever since. Besides his widow, deceased is survived by one son, Benjamin Lundy, who resides in Woodhouse, one daughter having died some years ago.

The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon at Port Dover cemetery. Rev. H. J. Harnwell, of Jarvis, conducted the service at the house and Rev. J. Robertson, of Port Dover, officiated at the grave.
