Arthur Slater Dead.

People of the vicinity were great-
ly shocked to hear of the death of
Arthur Slater while on a visit to
his son, Wallis, in Cleveland.

When heard from last Mr. Slater
was enjoying his visit and in good
health, but on Saturday evening
he complained of feeling slightly
unwell and it was not until Mon-
day noon his condition became seri-
ous death resulting the same night
from hemorrhage of the stomach.
His son, Wallis, accompanied the
remains home arriving here this
morning. The funeral will be held
from the family residence, Walpole
township, tomorrow afternoon at
2.30; interment in Knox church
cemetery.

The late Mr. Slater was well
known and highly respected by a
wide circle of friends. He was
born in the Shetland Islands, but at
the age of four came with his par-
ents to Canada and had lived al-
most continuously in this vicinity,
being in his 67th year. He was a
Presbyterian, a member of the
Masonic order and a life-long Con-
servative in politics. He is surviv-
ed by three sons, Wallis, of Cleve-
land, and John and Edward, of
Walpole. Mrs. Slater, who also
died suddenly, predeceased her
husband by a little over four years.
She, too, died on Monday and was
buried Thursday.

A Brilliant Young Scholar

On June 15 at the convocation of
the University of Chicago, William
Roy Peacock obtained the degree
of bachelor of science. He also
won the honor of obtaining a "C V"
sweater for making the water polo
team. His elective subjects in his
degrees were taken in law. He has
been engaged by Professor Whila-
ton to assist in compiling a book on
pleading so will not return to his
parental home until September.
Next year he will continue his work
for the degree of doctor of law.

Mr. Peacock has had a brilliantly
successful scholastic career. At the
age of ten he entered the high
school; at sixteen he passed the
senior matriculation at Toronto
with honors; at eighteen obtained
the associate degree with honors at
Chicago university, and at twenty
his bachelor of science degree. His
education has been under the direc-
tion of his uncle, Dr. Albert Pea-
cock, of Chicago.
