

Sunshine grates have maximum strength

Sunshine Furnace has four triangular grate bars, each having three distinct sides. In the single-piece and two-piece grate, the provisions for expansion or contraction, and a waste of coal always follows a shaking.

On the left- and right-hand sides are cotter pins, which when loosened permit the grates to slide out. These four grate bars are made of heavy cast iron, and are finished up with bulldog teeth. The teeth will grind up the toughest clinker; and

because the grates are made in sections, not only can nothing but dust and ashes pass through, but after each shaking a different side can be presented to the fire. Also, with the Sunshine grate there is no back-breaking movements attached to the shaking. By gently rocking the lever, first on the left, and then on the right, the ashes are released on both sides, and fall through into the pan.

Suggestive Questions on the Sunday School Lesson by Rev. Dr. Kimball.

June 27th, 1909.
 Temperance Lesson. Rom. xiii: 8-14.
 Golden Text.—Put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ.—Rom. xiii: 14.
 Verse 8.—Is it always sinful to go into debt, when you have no visible means of paying it?
 Is it right, or wrong, to go into debt when you have nothing to pay with, if your creditor knows your circumstances?
 Is a business man who has honestly failed in business and given up all he has to his creditors under moral obligation to pay the balance of the debt, if he makes enough money to do so out of future business?
 Under modern business conditions, and the law of love and righteousness, when wholesalers sell on time, or give an adequate discount for cash to retailers, why are not the debts of an honest bankrupt retailer, the legitimate loss of his creditors in common with himself?
 Wherein consists the folly and sin of a wage-earner in constant work, getting into debt?
 Is it the duty of everybody to love everybody the bad and the good, enemies and friends?
 What is the advantage of loving everybody, to ourselves, and to those whom we love?
 Verses 9-10.—Give reasons, outside of the Bible, that will cover all circumstances, why it is always wrong to disobey these five moral prohibitions. (This question must be answered in writing by members of the club.)
 Must all such acts, as are here forbidden, contravene the law of love to make them sinful; for example, if you had to kill a man who was about to kill one of your loved ones, would that be sinful?

The directors of the Hamilton art school Monday night discussed the question of closing the school owing to financial conditions, and it was decided to close the school at once and not to re-engage the teachers. The board of education will be asked to take the school over.

W. H. Howard of Caledonia left for Cobalt last week to prospect on his mining claim there.
 S. A. Overend of Caledonia has secured a position for the summer in a drug store at Niagara-on-the-Lake.
 Plans are under way, it is semi-officially announced, for an immense new roundhouse to be built by the C. P. R. at London, Ont.
 Mrs. Minier, a Hamilton woman, who wandered away to Caledonia, was taken to the city Monday night, and will be detained on a charge of insanity.
 It is understood that the T. Eaton company is purchasing the Montrose paper mills at Thorold. The mills will be used to manufacture the paper for their school book contract.
 The sale of the Grimsby Park company's property takes place on July 7 in the chambers of the local master at Hamilton. It will be by public auction, and all the property, both real and personal, will go under the hammer.
 The schooner Julia Larson is being repaired preparatory to her removal to Long Point, where she will be anchored behind Bluff Bar for the accommodation of Port Dover fishermen during their operations on the north of the island.
 Owing to the exhibition grounds and track being in the hands of the contractors, where important improvements are taking place, the Dominion day celebration at Caledonia has been called off for this year, as the grounds will not be ready in time.
 While H. Fretz, of Tintern, was plowing on hard ground one day last week, the doubletree broke, and as he had the reins around him at the time, he was pulled over the plow striking his face on the coulter with considerable force almost knocking out an eye besides badly disfiguring his face.
 The will of the late John Neilson, for many years employed by Bunting, Gillies & Co., wholesale paper dealers, Hamilton, has been entered for probate. It disposes of an estate of \$224, consisting of cash in the bank, which is left solely to St. Peter's Home for Incurables. The surrogate court officials, pay this is the first will in Wentworth in which an entire estate was left to charity.
 John Snow, of Pottersburg, bought a cow from a farmer living at Thorndale, and was taking it home when the animal, which was somewhat wild, became mad from the heat and began to chase the driver. When near a large culvert the cow made a dash for a boy who stood near. The boy quickly jumped aside and the cow, in her rush, went over the embankment and broke her neck in the fall. The boy had a narrow escape, but did not get a scratch.
 Warren Mallory, a lad who worked for Jacob Rick, of Binbrook, was brought before Judge Monck Saturday morning to elect on a charge of stealing a horse, rig and harness from his employer. While Mr. Rick was absent at a picnic, the lad took the outfit for a drive to Dunnville, where he was arrested. Before leaving on the jaunt he helped himself to a pie from the pantry. The lad elected to be tried by the judge and his case was to be disposed of this week.
 Geo. C. Thomson, acting for Garnet W. Hamilton has issued a writ against W. D. Swayze, of Dunnville, assignee of Hamilton & Hayden, general storekeepers, of Hazersville. The claim is for \$998.85 for arrears in salary, the plaintiff having been a manager for the defunct firm. He also asks for a declaration that a portion of his claim be given priority to the claims of the ordinary and general creditors, and that the remainder of his claim be classed with the ordinary ones.
 A case was heard before Magistrate Love Thursday morning, when two London seedmen, both of whom started business this spring, were charged with violating the seed act by having in their possession and offering for sale quantities of alsike clover seed containing more weed-seed than the law allows. The charge was laid by T. G. Raynor, seed inspector for the Dominion Government, and both men pleaded guilty. One of the men, who said he got the seed when he took over the business, was fined a nominal sum. The other said he secured his seed out of town. This case will be investigated.
