## Old Pioneer Gone.

There passed to his long rest, on Thursday, March 11th, after a short illness at the home of his son Alfred, in Jarvis, Mr. Sylvester Underhill. He was born in Walpole, March 9th, 1824. He was one of those who saw the beautiful township of Walpole when it was in the undisputed possession of the deer, the bear, the wolf, the Indian and the only path was the Indian trail. He took to himself a helpmeet in the fifties, who on the farm and when retired was his constant companion till she was called home some nine years ago. Since her death he has made his home with his son Alfred.

## Death of Mrs. Wilson

By the death of Mrs. Isabella Wilson, relict of the late John Wilson, which occurred on Thursday last, Walpole township loses another of its old residents. Mrs. Wilson, who was in her 80th year, suffered a stroke last April and since last June had been almost continually confined to her bed.

The deceased, whose maiden name was Isabella Watson, was born near Port Hope, Ont., and moved with her parents first to Mud Street, Walpole township, where she was married. They then moved into Woodhouse township, living near Varenay. About 40 years ago they moved back to Walpole on to the present homestead. She was predeceased by her husband about 25 years. Mrs. Wilson is survived by a family of five sons and four daughters. The sons are James B., of Hagersville; John, of Erie; William, of Paris; Thomas, of Hiram, N. Y.; and Robert on the homestead. The daughters are Mrs. Watson, of British Columbia; Mrs. Robert Spaven, of Cass City, Mich.; Mrs. Ephraim Boulton, Garnet, and Mrs. Thos. Caldwell, Springfield, N. Y. Mrs. Agnes Humphreys, of Hagersville, and Mrs. Philip Park, of Houghton, are sisters.

Beloved and respected in the family circle, Mrs. Wilson was also most highly esteemed by her many friends and neighbors. She was a consistent member of Knox church, Jarvis, to which the funeral was held on Sunday morning; Rev. D. M. Buchanan preaching a memorial sermon in lieu of the regular service. The pallbearers were six grandsons: James and William Wilson, Erie; Harry Wilson, Paris; Frank Wilson, Hagersville, and Watson and Wallace Boulton, Garnet.

## Cayuga 10, Jarvis 8

On Friday night Cayuga and Jarvis hockey teams met on the local ice, the above score being the result. The Cayuga team was composed of members of both junior and senior teams. There was delay again in starting owing to a change being made in the Jarvis line-up.

Three minutes after the start Cayuga scored and quickly followed with another on a swift shot by Walsh. Then Jarvis made a sport.

After a short time the Jarvis team scored. After a few minutes of splendid combination, Mason again scored for Jarvis, and then Henderson scored the locals last goal in the first half on a long shot. With the score standing 4-2 in Jarvis's favor things looked a little blue for the visitors but this seemed to put energy into them and they started in with a great spurt, making things very lively for a few minutes and scoring three goals after some brilliant combination. This last ten minutes of play demonstrated clearly the superiority of team play over individual playing—a point Jarvis is apt to overlook. This ended the scoring in the first half. There were a number of off-sides in this half, but Referee Murray looked after these in a fairly impartial manner, sometimes seeming a bit unfair to Jarvis by several times stopping them in a rush especially so when Henderson started up the ice, but on the whole his work was satisfactory.

Leishman, for Cayuga, scored the first goal in the last half, going right through the Jarvis defence and showing his cleverness as a stick handler. Even the Jarvis enthusiasts were forced to cheer his play. Then followed a monotonous ten minutes in which the two point men hit the puck to each other. A goal scored on this kind of work is more by good luck than good playing and this marked the goal now scored by Smith for Jarvis. Henderson also scored and this made the excitement intense as there were only two minutes more to play and Cayuga was one ahead, but Smith quieted the fears of the Jarvis fans by evening the score just thirty seconds before full time. Score 7-7. It was decided to play off with two five minute ends, and both teams started in determined to win. Excitement on the part of the spectators was at fever heat. Barry, Cayuga's centre, broke the tie with a nice shot from centre ice. This was followed by one from Leishman ending the scoring for the first five minutes. Score 9-7 for Cayuga. When the teams had changed ends Barry was so unkind as to repeat his trick of scoring another goal, and now the Jarvis supporters certainly did look down in the mouth while the Cayuga rooters were extremely jubilant. Henderson scored the only goal Jarvis secured in the over-time after some good work on his part. This ended the scoring making Cayuga 10, Jarvis 8.
