Chief Brant's Bones

Brantford has become quite interested in the recent claim of Dr. McMichael, of Buffalo, that he is in possession of the skull, two pelvic bones and the right femur of Chief Joseph Brant, the noted Indian leader, whose remains were interred in a vault in the Mohawk churchyard near the city about one hundred years ago. The Brant historical society has been investigating the Buffalo story. From what can be learned, it appears that Dr. Healy, who once practised medicine in Brantford, in company with a party of Toronto medical students, made a midnight visit to the churchyard in the fall of 1879 and procured some bones. At that time it is said, the tomb of Brant was pillaged, and the visitors insisted that Dr. Healy take the skull, which, it is alleged, he did. It is said it passed out of his hands before he died some years ago out west, and that the person who then secured it recently conveyed it, together with a statement as to the facts of the case, to Dr. McMichael, who now offers to present it to Brantford. In Brantford the whole incident is regarded with doubt. Rev. Robert Ashton, head of the Mohawk church and principal of the Mohawk institute, is in Bermuda and cannot be interviewed. His son, Captain Neil Ashton, does not entertain the claim. About ten years ago, he says, the tomb of Brant was broken open one night. Next morning, in company with others, he sealed it up, first investigating the conditions within. In the tomb, he says, there were two skulls, supposedly those of Brant and a relative with whom he was interred. There were no bones. If twenty years previously Brant's skull had been removed, it would appear that another must have been substituted in its place.

The wife and children of ex-Chief Malone, of Simcoe, have gone to Philadelphia to reside with Mrs. Malone's sister.

Suggestive Questions on the Sunday School Lesson by Rev. Dr. Linscott.

March 28th, 1909.

Temperance Lesson. Proverbs xiii: 29-35.

Golden Text.—At last it biteth like a serpent, and stingeth like an adder. Proverbs xiii: 32.

Verses 29-30.—Is strong drink as a beverage in so called moderation good for anybody?

Do all who drink habitually receive injury as a result?

Should alcohol be used in any form as a medicine?

Is it safe or prudent, for people in good health to take intoxicating drink as a beverage?

What classes in the community are suffering from the drinking habit, directly and indirectly?

Why do athletes always abstain from drinking when they are in training for a contest?

What are the signs by which you can nearly always tell a drinking man?

Verses 31-32.—What evil is likely to result if any, when a good man who does not drink, stands at the bar and "looks" on, while his companions are drinking?

What can you say of a man who will not drink himself but treats others?

How would you characterize a temperance man who votes for a man, or a party, pledged to support the liquor traffic?

How many evils can you trace to strong drink?

Think of all the popular habits that tend to evil, and compare them with the evils of the drink habit, and say which habit is the greater curse to the nation?

What is the fascination, which draws so many thousands of victims to the drink habit?

If the country towns and cities were overrun with "serpents" and "adders," which were biting and causing the death of thousands, what steps would likely be taken to eradicate the plague?

Seeing that all practically admit that the evils of the liquor traffic are more virulent than "serpents" and "adders" could be, how do you explain the apathy of the nation in getting rid of this monstrous evil? (This question must be answered in writing by members of the club.)

Verses 33.—Does licentiousness, and impurity of thought, generally accompany the appetite for strong drink, as this verse seems to suggest?

Verses 34-35.—Does drinking always produce moral, as well as physical anaesthesia, deadening the soul to the foulest crimes?

Dills—Persons that the minutes of the last meeting be adopted as read. Carried. The following communications were read:

Dominion Gas Company; Clerk of the Legislative Assembly; Jacob Kohler; The Salvation Army; John W. Henning; Wood Gundy & Co.; S. C. McDonald; J. Gonnell; A. Williamson; Selkirk Business Men's Association.

Shaver—Roultson. That a special meeting to report on communications to be composed of Mr. Bain, Mr. H. I. Mr. Powell and Mr. Parsons. Carried.

Parsons—Dunnet. That a special committee be appointed to consider the tenders for printing as submitted and be composed of the following: Messrs Roultson, Dunnet, Murray, Smelter, Carried.

Smelter—Dills. That we do not meet to allow the special committees to meet.
