

To the warden and council: We, your road and bridge committee beg leave to report as follows: The chairman and Messrs. Roulston and Dunnell met the commissioner of works of the Indian department at Van Loon's bridge. We found the bridge in a very unsafe condition; one of the abutments is falling into the creek. After some consultation it was thought advisable to erect a new bridge, thirty feet span on concrete abutments, the Indian department agreeing to pay one-half the cost. We would also recommend the purchase of a steel bridge similar to plans shown herewith at a cost of \$343 complete. All of which is respectfully submitted. A. Shaver, chairman.

That the report of the building committee be adopted as read and that leave be granted to introduce a bill to build a house of refuge on the county property at Dunnville and that the bill be read a first time. Bain—Parsons. That the annual grant of \$25 be given to the Haldimand farmers institute. Carried.
Murray—Mino. That the warden and clerk be and are hereby authorized to sign the resolution of the Selkirk business men's association. Carried.

Parsons—Dunnell. That the council hereby authorize the clerk to obtain from Mr. Glenn of St. Thomas, his written opinion re pars lot at Dunnville. Our clerk to supply him with all information relating to the same at hand and to report to council after adjournment; to meet Thursday at 10 a. m., March 25. Carried.
