to 30c; potatoes 60c bus.; apples
15c pk.; parsnips 15c pk.; beans 15c
pk.; turnips 35c bush.; carrots 40c
bush.; cabbage 5c to 10c head;
squash 5c to 10c each; Oyster plant
5c bunch; winter radishes 15c pk.

The New Train Service.

On and after Nov. 15, train now
leaving Simcoe at 8.25 a.m. will
leave at 7.40; leave Renfrew 7.30,
arrive in Jarvis 7.40; leave Jarvis
7.45; arrive in Hamilton 8.55 and
Toronto 10.05, which is nearly two
hours earlier than at present. Con-
nections will also be made at Jarvis
for Nelles Corners, Cayuga, and
Canfield Jet. The North bound
train will leave Port Dover at 6.50
instead of seven o'clock and the
Port Dover train for Jarvis will
leave at 7.15 instead of 7.50. Morn-
ing train will leave Port Rowan at
5.45 instead of 6.45.

Jarvis Evaporator Burned

On Tuesday morning at about 6
o'clock Johnston Bros. evaporator
was discovered to be on fire by one
of the night watchmen, and the
alarm given when a large crowd of
willing workers were soon on hand
and did their best to extinguish the
fire and save the property, but the
fire had gained too much headway
to be able to save anything of much
value. The fire is supposed to have
started in one of the drying kilns
from sulphur which is used in
bleaching the apples, but this is
not positively known.

There was a large amount of eva-
porated apples in the building as
well as those that had not yet been
prepared for the dry kiln. The
loss on the building and contents
will be over \$7,000, while the insur-
ance is placed at about \$4,500.

This will be a very heavy loss to
Johnston Bros. and also to farmers
and townspeople, as quite a number
of hands will be out of work and
the farmers who still have apples
for sale will not find as good a
market.

Johnson Bros. have not as yet
decided if they will rebuild or not,
but it is to be hoped that they will
as it is a benefit to the townspeople
and a greater benefit to the farmer
who has an apple orchard.

The pickling factory, which is
located but a few feet east of the
evaporator, escaped uninjured.

There were three or four cars
loads of apples on the G. T. R.
tracks for the evaporator, which is
expected to be sent to Simcoe.
