### Less Drinking.

The British Chancellor of the Ex-  
chequer, referring to the slump in  
the revenue from spirits caused by  
increased taxation laid on alcoholic  
liquors said:

"Not only were thousands of  
people drinking less than since the  
liquor duties were raised, but some  
had stopped drinking altogether.  
The budget, he added, has had an  
extraordinary effect upon the habits  
of the people. In some districts in  
Ireland the consumption of liquor  
had declined seventy per cent. In  
Scotland it had declined fifty per  
cent., and what particularly could  
not be accounted for was that many  
people had not been driven from  
one liquor to another, but had  
ceased drinking altogether. He es-  
timated the reduction at quite 8-  
10,000,000 gallons in the spirits con-  
sumed. That involved an enormous  
improvement in the habits of the  
people, and, as they were drink-  
ing less beer, he admitted that the  
social improvement would be gi-  
gantic. He believed that hence-  
forth there would be a permanent  
reduction of twenty per cent. in  
the spirits drunk in Great Britain.  
This might mean the loss of work  
to a few hundreds, but it would  
enormously increase the comfort  
and happiness in thousands of  
homes.

### New Lord Pentland.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—Lord Pentland,  
who has been mentioned as a possi-  
ble Governor general for Canada in  
succession to Earl Grey, was Mili-  
tary Secretary to Lord Aberdeen  
during his term as Governor Gen-  
eral of Canada.

He was plain John Sinclair. On  
leaving Canada he was elected to  
the British House from a Scottish  
constituency, and became Secretary  
for Scotland. He was advanced to  
the Peerage, with the title of Lord  
Pentland, a couple of years ago.  
He is a son-in-law of Lord Aber-  
deen.

### Insane Because Married.

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 4.—Judge  
Marvin of the Probate Court an-  
nounced to-day that he would ap-  
point a conservator for Mrs. Lucinda  
Treat Goddard, the seventy-year-  
old wife of Charles R. Goddard, a  
Yale student, who but recently  
reached his twenty-first birthday.

The court said that Mrs. God-  
dard's changed attitude towards  
men and her marriage to a young  
man "together presents a picture of  
weakened judgement, lack of con-  
trol of impulses, childish caprice  
and marked ethical insensibility  
indicative of mental impairment  
and disease.

An appeal has been taken. The  
woman's husband has been arraigned  
on a charge of perjury in the  
giving of his wife's age as 34 instead  
of 70 when procuring a marriage  
license.

### More Mileage for Jurors.

The Sheriffs of the Province have  
received notification from the At-  
torney-General's Department that  
the payment for grand and petit  
jurors at the Fall Assizes will be  
\$2.50 a day and 13 cents a mile.  
The per diem allowance was in-  
creased one year ago from \$2.00, but  
the new mileage rate, an increase  
of 10 cents goes into effect for the  
first time.

London, Nov. 4.—The Canadian  
Bank of Commerce, Lloyds, and  
the Bank of Scotland have closed  
the list for the Canadian North-  
ern issue, \$4,250,000 of the  
loan having been fully subscribed  
and the underwriters are entirely  
relieved. Subscriptions were more  
numerous than for any previous  
loan, and despite adverse money  
conditions the loan was a success.

## The Late Mrs. Miller.

Many friends here and through-  
out the district learned with deep  
regret of the death of Mrs. Robert  
Miller at the home of his parents,  
Mr. and Mrs. Gilbertson, King St.  
on Saturday last. Bright's disease  
was the cause of death. Her home  
is near Nanticoke and about two  
weeks ago she came here on a visit  
to her parents, hoping that a rest  
and change would improve her  
health. Unfortunately the disease  
made rapid progress and despite  
every care and attention she con-  
tinued to grow weaker until death  
ensued. She was in her 29th year.

Margaret Miller was born at Vi-  
toria, Norfolk County in 1880. Her  
parents later moved to Oneida and  
thence to Hagersville where she re-  
sided up to two years ago when she  
was married to Robt. Miller, of  
Walpole. She possessed a sweet  
disposition and was a general favor-  
ite among a wide circle of friends.  
She was a consistent member of the  
Presbyterian church. The funeral  
on Tuesday last to the Hagersville  
cemetery was largely attended,  
Rev. Lowry officiating at the house  
and at the grave. The floral offer-  
ings were numerous and beautiful.

### Shot While Picking Apples.

Welland, Nov. 3.—John McMillan,  
aged 79 years, while picking apples  
in his orchard near Port Colborne  
yesterday afternoon, was struck  
in the stomach by a bullet from a  
32-calibre rifle. The old man,  
who lives alone, had some diffi-  
culty in making his way to the  
nearest neighbor's. Medical aid  
was called and it is thought that he  
will recover, though the course of  
the bullet was five inches long.

Two boys aged 15, Gordon Beam  
and Howard Armstrong, have con-  
fessed to having been shooting  
near by.

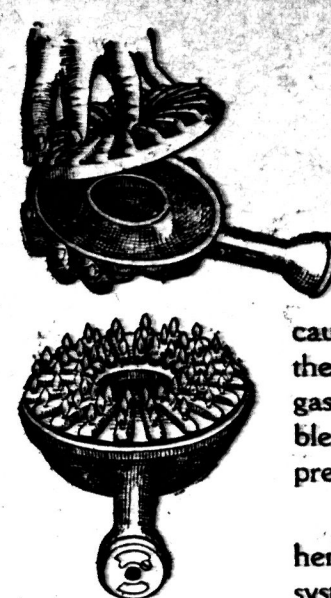
