A BUSY PASTOR.

During the nine years that Rev. Canon Belt was rector of Grace Church he officiated at 165 baptisms, 100 funerals, 26 marriages and had 76 confirmed. At the Brick Works he baptised 147. The debt on the church has been reduced by \$2,000, \$1,000 spent on the Sunday School, and the church at the Brick Works has been built and paid for—a record that no minister need be ashamed of.

The Rev. Canon Belt, Mrs. Belt, the members of the Women's Auxiliary and the officers of Grace Church, Milton, were entertained at a dinner by Mrs. F. Martin at the New Royal on the evening of Nov. 3rd, given in honor of the Rev. Canon and Mrs. Belt, who would have an opportunity to meet together in a social way, those who had been associated with him in his work, before his departure to Jarvis, his new field of labor. At 8.30, the company, to the number of twenty-two, set down to tables tastefully decorated with roses and ferns and laden with choicest fruits and dainties. The guests after having partaken of an excellent repast, the various courses being so well and beautifully served, such as the New Royal is noted for, adjourned to the parlour, where a very pleasant time was spent in conversation, music and song. Choir Leader Collins, Organist Wheeler, Miss Lulu Hall and Mrs. F. J. Martin contributing. A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. and Mrs. Martin for their kindness in calling them together and after expressing their regrets that the Rev. gentleman and his family were leaving them they bade all good night after singing the National Anthem.

The Canon was taken by surprise, and expressed his thanks and appreciation for the beautiful gift so kindly made, and desired the wardens to convey to his late parishioners his very deep sense of their good will towards himself and his family and prayed God's richest blessings might rest upon them all. Mrs. Belt was also the recipient of a handsome set of silver spoons, presented by the Women's Auxiliary, of which she was honorary President. The citizens of the town generally regret the removal of this amiable family from the community. Following this, on Tuesday afternoon an At Home was given by Mrs. Belt, at which a number of friends were present to add kindly farewells to Mrs. Belt. A most enjoyable time was spent.

Jarvis Xmas Market.

Wednesday, Dec. 22nd, 1909

Jarvis is to have its first Xmas market this year and from all appearance it will be a grand success.

The managing committee have been and are still at work arranging the list and now have it nearly completed. There are nineteen classes besides a number of specials, and they are nearly all filled. The list will be published in a few days, and those having poultry, etc. for sale should see it as very large prices are offered.

There are eight classes in turkeys—the 1st is for turkeys from 16 to 20 lbs. and the prices range from \$9.00 to \$8.00; 2nd, 12 to 16 lbs., at from \$8.00 to \$7.00; 3rd, 10 to 14 lbs., at from \$7.00 to \$5.00; 4th, 10 lbs. and under, at from \$5.25 to \$4.25; 5th, heavy weight, at from \$5.00 to \$3.50; 6th, 14 lbs. or under, at from \$5.00 to \$3.75; 7th, 12 lbs. or under, at from \$4.00 to \$2.75; 8th, best hen turkey, at from \$3.50 to \$2.75. In ducks the prices are from \$3.00 to \$1.70, and for chickens \$2.50 to \$1.25.

Besides poultry there are large prices for butter, eggs, honey and apples, and a number of specials.
