There are eight classes in turkeys the 1st is for turkeys from 16 to 20 lbs. and the prices range from \$9.00 to \$8.00; 2nd, 12 to 16 lbs., at from \$8.00 to \$7.00; 3rd, 10 to 14 lbs., at from \$7.00 to \$5.00; 4th, 10 lbs. and under, at from \$5.25 to \$4.25; 5th, heavy weight, at from \$5.00 to \$3.50; 6th, 14 lbs. or under, at from \$5.00 to \$3.75; 7th, 12 lbs. or under, at from \$4.00 to \$2.75; 8th, best hen turkey, at from \$3.50 to \$2.75. In ducks the prices are from \$3.00 to \$1.70, and for chickens \$2.50 to \$1.25.

Besides poultry there are large prices for butter, eggs, honey and apples, and a number of specials.
