Obituary.

McMURCHY—On Nov. 20th, 1909, the community of Garnet was again suddenly called to mourn the loss of one among the old and most respected of its members in the person of Mrs. Alex. McMurchy, whose maiden name was Ester Rodgers.

She was born in Co. Fermanagh, Ireland, June 1839 and emigrated with her father to the township of York while yet young. She was married to Alexander McMurchy about 1854, who came with her to Walpole some 30 years ago and raised five of a family.

Her husband predeceased her by nearly 12 years, and her home has been with her son Alex. on the old homestead since.

She was at her place in Garnet church the Sunday previous to death and was up and around the day before her decease. A general break up of the system complicated with heart weakness brought on sudden collapse and on Saturday afternoon she passed away. A week before she enjoyed a visit to her many friends in Jarvis little thinking it would be her last. She was a lifelong member of the Methodist church, with undivided trust in her God, a loving and helpful neighbor and a most affectionate mother. She will be greatly missed.

The funeral was on Monday afternoon. It was conducted by her pastor, assisted at the home by Rev. H. B. Christie, and at the service in the Methodist church, Jarvis, by Rev. Mr. Buchanan.

The pall-bearers were Thos. Harrop, Thos. Parkinson, Geo. Dales, Chas. Walker, A. Meill and Wm. T. Riddell all of Garnet.

She leaves to mourn their loss one sister, Mrs. Kays of London, two sons, William and Alexander, Garnet, and one daughter, Lovena of Toronto. The sympathy of the community is extended to those bereaved.
