Miss Louie Byrens, after spending the past week with friends in town, returned to her home in Hamilton on Monday.

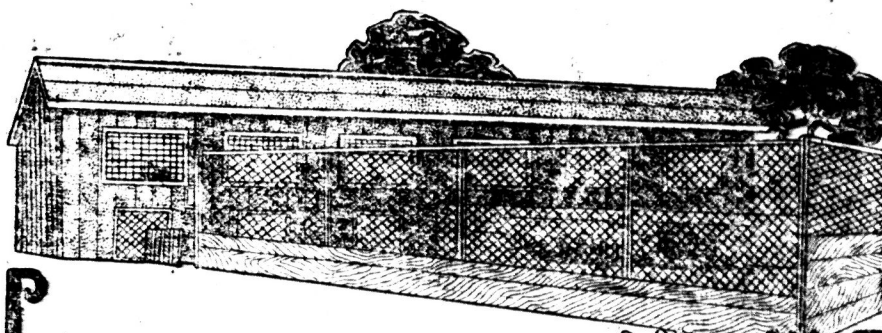
The annual Xmas tree and entertainment in connection with All Saint's church will be held on Tuesday evening, Jan. 11th. A splendid program may be expected.
