Explosion Wrecks Aylmer.

A catastrophe which has no par-
allel in the history of Aylmer de-
cided on this little town at 7
o'clock last night (Tuesday). As a
result of an unexplained explosion
of the boiler in the Aylmer Electric
Light & Waterworks, Harry Fisher,
the engineer, is dead, the plant itself
is a mass of wreck and ruin, and
the Brandon shoe factory, owned
by Messrs. O. E. Peterson and A.
Brandon, formerly of Toronto, is
reduced to a smouldering heap of
ashes. The estimated loss is about
\$200,000, of which \$50,000 will be
borne by the town's light and water
plant, and \$150,000 by the shoe fac-
tory. Both are well covered by in-
surance.

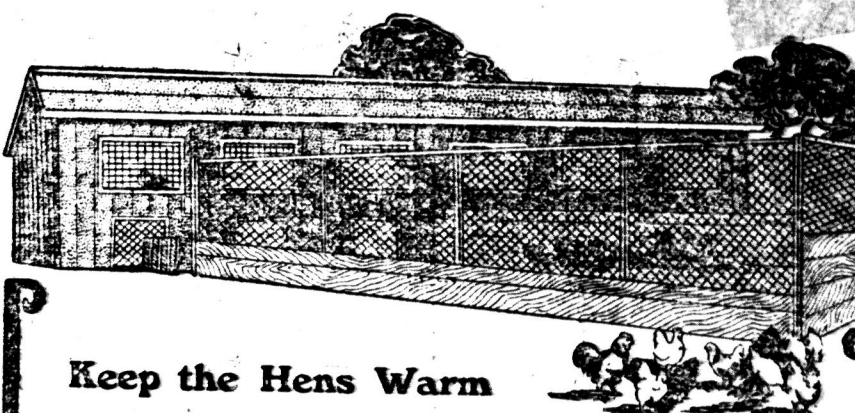
