## Passed Peacefully Away.

Mr. John Stadder passed peace-  
fully away at his home in Jarvis,  
on Sunday evening last at about  
nine o'clock, at the ripe old age of  
88 years, after being confined to  
the house for a number of years.  
He was a well-known and highly  
respected resident of Jarvis and an  
old pioneer of Walpole township.

Mr. Stadder was born in York-  
shire, England, in 1821, and emi-  
grated to Canada in 1843, locating  
in Scarborough, where he remained for  
years. On January 9th, 1849 he  
married Miss Ruth Cowan, of Cum-  
berland, Eng., and moved to lot 21,  
con. 9, Walpole the same year, at  
that time the township being nearly  
a wilderness.

To Mr. and Mrs. Stadder were  
born six children—one daughter  
died in infancy, and their son  
Charles when 29 years of age. Two  
sons and two daughters survive  
they are William, of Rainham, and  
Joseph, who lives on the old home-  
stead, Mrs. Mary Rutherford of  
Rainham, and Mrs. Elizabeth Fee-  
ney of South Cayuga.

Mrs. Stadder predeceased her  
husband many years ago, and Mr.  
Stadder has been married three  
times since, his last wife, who sur-  
vive him, being Miss Rebecca Eaid,  
of Jarvis.

Mr. Stadder being one of the  
old pioneers, did much in the set-  
tlement and development of this  
section. He possessed a sturdy  
character and an amiable dispo-  
sition that endeared him to all  
with whom he came in contact,  
and made him a sterling husband,  
father and citizen, who will be  
mourned by all. In religion he was  
a Presbyterian and in politics a  
staunch Reformer.

The funeral took place from his  
late home at one o'clock today,  
(Wednesday) interment taking  
place at Osborne cemetery (Gill  
P. O.), service being conducted  
both at the house and Osborne  
church.

The sympathy of their many friends  
is in their bereavement.

## Methodists in Session.

The pastors and lay delegates  
comprising the Simcoe District,  
which extends from Port Rowan in  
the West, to Cayuga, held their fi-  
nancial district meeting at Cheap-  
side on Wednesday last. After the  
usual routine work had been ac-  
complished, other important mat-  
ters engaged the attention of the  
delegates. A strong resolution re-  
solved the charter of the Metropolitan As-  
sociation for gambling at races, was  
passed in condemnatory terms.  
Where the Dominion Alliance re-  
presentatives occupy our pulpits in  
behalf of their funds, one half the  
envelope and plate contributions  
are to be handed the representative  
and the other half to go to Temper-  
ance and Moral Reform Association  
of the Methodist church. A dis-  
cussion on the Classmeeting occu-  
pied the evening session.

On Thursday the annual Epworth  
League Institute was held at the  
same place. There were three ses-  
sions, each well attended. The  
banner for the year goes to the  
Simcoe League for largest increas-  
es in membership and missionary  
givings. Two enthusiastic address-  
es given by Dr. McKenzie of Japan.  
A great work still to be done there,  
and much encouragement, with  
what has already been accomplish-  
ed. Mr. Eaten of Toronto stirred  
the hearts of the convention by his  
persistent appeal for workers and  
funds, emphasizing a special study  
of missions in classes. F. W. Har-  
dy, B. A., who has been campaigning  
the district with stereotyping  
views of Indian work in the far  
west where he has been engaged,  
gave a most convincing address on  
"What of our western heritage?"  
emphasized the great need of those  
from Ontario going west to carry  
with them the strongest manhood,  
for in the whirl of money getting  
so many go morally down, even  
ministers drop out of their calling,  
where there is great need for them  
to hold up the cross, and go into  
other occupations for lucrative gain.  
After the usual complimentary  
votes of thanks to the hostesses of  
Cheapside and to the speakers from  
a distance a most successful con-  
vention was brought to a close.
