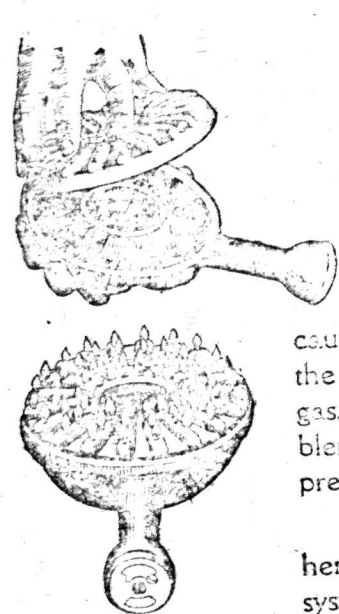

Corrupting Children.

Montreal, Sept. 3.—Extraordinary evidence of how the police promised bribes to Henri Goulet, a young boy, and his little sister, to give evidence against his mother, was related before the Royal Commission this afternoon. Henri Goulet, the boy who says he was promised bribes, told how he and his sister had been taken by two policemen from their mother's home at night, given a late supper in a restaurant, and how they were offered \$25 and \$5 respectively for going before the Royal Commission and repeating evidence against their mother that had previously been given in the Recorder's Court. The police wanted the evidence repeated against Mrs. Goulet so as to clear themselves from the charge of conspiring to arrest George Vandenberg, a prominent citizen of the north end, and an old-time rival of Ald. Proulx, Chairman of the Police Committee.

He Killed His Mother.

Pottsville, Pa., Sept. 2.—After killing his mother, probably a week ago, George F. Simons, 21 years old, shot and killed himself to-night at the home of Violet Hartranft, to who he had been paying attention. The body of the mother was found in the attic of her home to-night by the father. The door of the room was fastened with large screws, and the crevices were sealed with paraffine. The body was in a horrible decomposed condition. It is believed she was strangled. It is thought the man quarrelled with his mother about his attentions to the woman.

Horse Fell on Babies.

St. Catharines, Sept. 3.—A very serious accident was narrowly averted on Sunday of last week and children laying on almost miraculous escape from death. Mrs. Goulet, and her young sister, Lily Hilton, aged twelve years, were wheeling a baby carriage containing two children, when a horse, belonging to W. A. Brown of Thorold, approached them driving a suitcase. The animal became frightened, reared at a trot and then, it is said, the road and reared upon its hind legs, coming down upon the baby carriage and completely destroyed it. The two children in some unaccountable manner escaped uninjured. Mrs. Goulet was slightly bruised and shaken. Lily Hilton was cut about the back of the head, rendering several stitches necessary.

Mrs. Macdonald's Death.

Cornwall, Sept. 3.—The death of Mrs. John Sandfield Macdonald, widow of the late Hon. John Sandfield Macdonald, first Premier of Ontario, occurred at her residence here to-day. Although in her 90th year, Mrs. Macdonald was quite active up to a couple of weeks ago, when she was taken ill. Her daughter, Madame Langlois of Portneuf, Quebec, and her only surviving son, Mr. George Sandfield Macdonald of Montreal, were with her during her illness. The other surviving children are Mrs. (Col.) Uppeby and Mrs. (Col.) Pemberton, both in England.

Provincial Inspector Avarst and two of his liquor detectives were mobbed at Ingersoll and several have been made.

Two Small boys, Ardie and Alex. Mike, entered Fleming & Dixon's store, Hagersville, through the window on Sunday of last week and helped themselves to candy, peanuts, cheese, pipes, tobacco, cigars, chewing gum, etc., to the value of about \$15. They carried the goods away in a basket and two sacks. A party living near the store saw the boys leaving with their spoil and sent word to Mr. Dixon, who secured the services of Constable Rispin. The boys were lying in the grass near the M. C. R. Y. and finding they were discovered ran to Mr. Scott's bush, leaving the basket behind. Constable Rispin gave chase and captured them after frightening the boys by firing his revolver in the air. They were taken to the lock-up and released after a few hours confinement in the cells. The following night they appeared before Justices Howard and Crozier and pleaded guilty to the charge. In view of their youth and this being their first offence they were allowed to go on suspended sentence, two surities of \$100 each being required for their good behavior for a period of six months.

Apple buyers report an excellent crop in Ontario west of Toronto.

Stettler, Alta., Sept. 3.—The body of Avron Woldrich, the Belgian who murdered his wife near here some time ago, was found in a well on T. H. Braem's place, three miles from here, on Thursday. He had committed suicide by drowning. Woldrich had been a fugitive since Dominion Day, when he committed the brutal crime.
