Sunday School Convention

The 43rd annual convention of the Haldimand County Sunday School Association, held in the Methodist church, Canfield, on Tuesday, Sept. 14th, was one of the most successful to be held in the County for some years. It consisted of three sessions, all of which were largely attended. In the absence of the president, Rev. M. B. Ryan, the duties of that position were performed jointly by Rev. Thos. Grandy and Mr. A. Mitchell during the morning session. After the election of officers had taken place, Mr. Andrew Rodgers of Jarvis, the newly elected president, took the chair and acted in his official capacity for the afternoon and evening sessions. The morning and afternoon meetings were opened with devotional exercises and Rev. B. W. Merrill, B. A., General Superintendent of the Baptist Sabbath School Board of Ontario and Quebec, gave a splendid address at each session.

These addresses were treats and would be most valuable to persons interested in Sunday School work. Mr. Merrill was a fine speaker, thoroughly at home on the platform and interested his audience as well as instructed them. The address of Rev. Mr. Clarkson of Nelles Corners in the afternoon was well delivered and contained some splendid ideas. In the absence of Rev. Dr. Wallace of Caledonia a short, but most excellent address was given by a gentleman of Dunnville. Mrs. Heasman of Fisherville also being absent, the Cradle Roll was omitted, but a splendid substitute was given by Mrs. R. V. Mills of Canfield, from whose talk all present derived both pleasure and benefit. Keen enjoyment and great satisfaction were the results of the "Question Drawer," which occupied quite a portion of the afternoon session, and many regretted when it was discontinued through lack of time. The evening session opened with a song service rendered by the joint choirs of Canfield and Cayuga. Mr. Rodgers, the newly-elected president, gave an address which all enjoyed. This gentleman has been connected with Sunday School work for nearly half a century and is admirably suited for his position. A most excellent account of the Provincial Convention at Orillia was given by Mr. J. W. McClung, Sweet's Corners, who was one of the delegates to that meeting. The talk of Rev. L. Wilkinson of Dunnville on teaching, with illustrations, was one of the most interesting of the session and was much enjoyed. The papers at this session were interspersed with music, among the selections being a splendidly rendered solo by Dr. Billings and a quartette by four of Cayuga's fine singers. During the afternoon the audience felt the excessive heat, to a certain extent, it being very sultry for the time of year, but every attention was shown visitors by the people of Canfield and the little rip down was enjoyed by all. Delegations came in on all trains and the meetings ran without one jar and were eminently successful and satisfactory. The officers for the ensuing year are:—Andrew Rodgers, Jarvis, president; Rev. D. G. MacPhail, Cayuga, vice-president; Alex. Mitchell, Cayuga, secretary; J. W. McClung, Sweet's Corners, treasurer.—Haldimand Advocate.

Ten Indians Drowned.

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 17.—F. Eastman, lighthouse-keeper at Race Rocks, who arrived here this morning, reports seeing a Columbia River boat capsized and some eight or ten Indians, including women and children, drowned yesterday morning during a strong southwest squall. A Hesquiot Indian, who arrived at the local agency this morning, reported that he was alone in a Columbia River boat which capsized yesterday near Race Rocks. He believes the lightkeeper was confused by seeing bags of ballast which he had on the windward side of the boat, but the lightkeeper is insistent that he saw the party drown, and says that his wife and assistant also witnessed the disaster. His report of the location of the disaster is different from that of the Indian, and the time is placed by him as 11 a. m., while the Indian states that he capsized after 12 o'clock.
