Since then she has not been seen. Her pay was found in the room, and it is feared she may have met with foul play.
Mr. Priestland, the father of the girl, who resides in Jarvis, was at one time a hotelkeeper on McNab street, in this city. He was in the city yesterday, but did not report the case to the police. The chief says he did not see the man, and knows nothing about the case.

It seems Miss Priestland (Nellie) was visiting friends over Easter and taken suddenly ill, and no one thought of notifying the office of the Standard Sewing Machine Co. (not Singer) where she is employed. Some alarm was felt by the many friends she has made since going to Montreal. The money found in her room was not her salary as she did not take up her last check.

A Directory of Breeders of Pure Bred Stock.

The Branch of the Live Stock Commissioner at Ottawa has issued a revised edition of the Directory of breeders of pure bred live stock in Canada. According to the preface page the work is a compilation of information received through correspondence from breeders in all the provinces in regard to the size of their breeding herds, and the number of males and females of the several breeds they have for sale. The Directory is prepared to assist persons in locating herds, studs and flocks in their respective neighborhoods, or in distant provinces from which pure bred animals may be procured. It is stated in the Directory that copies will be sent to ranchmen, stock breeders, secretaries of farmers' institutes, agricultural societies, live stock associations, and others who may apply for them.

Found Dead.

Late on Monday afternoon an old lady named Sarah Pollick, who has had her home with Mrs. Girrard for some time back, was found dead on the floor of her bedroom up stairs. It seems that during the winter she was fairly well and had been taken excellent care of by Mrs. Girrard, but about a week ago she went out and caught a severe cold which she did not succeed in throwing off.
On Monday forenoon she appeared to be not so well as usual and Dr. Jolley was sent for. Beyond the fact that she was very weak the doctor did not see anything specially wrong about his patient and so informed Mrs. Girrard who about noon finding Mrs. Pollick to be in bed breathing regularly, supposed she was sleeping as usual and left the house for a time. On her return she found Mrs. Pollick as stated on the floor. From the state of her clothing she was evidently in the act of dressing herself when the call came which none can disobey. The doctor pronounced the cause of death as heart failure.

The funeral was delayed till yesterday afternoon in order to communicate with her relatives but as all efforts to reach them by telegraph were unavailing it was deemed advisable to inter the remains in the Port Dover cemetery.
The deceased is supposed to have been somewhere between seventy and eighty years of age as near as can be judged.
No blame can be attached to any one under the circumstances as the deceased was being well cared for.—Port Dover Maple Leaf.
