Nellie Priestland Still Missing.

Mr. Priestland, before leaving for Montreal on Saturday, informed us that he had been misinformed by a telegram from Montreal at the time he gave us the item relating to his daughter being sick, and that she was really missing.

The daily papers have a good deal to say about Miss Priestland, but as yet there has not been anything definite as to her whereabouts. The following is the latest:

Montreal, April 18.—Mr. Priestland of Jarvis, Ontario, arrived in the city to-day to help in the search for his missing daughter, who disappeared about three weeks ago.

After consulting with the detectives and visiting her room, he has come to the conclusion that she is being detained here against her will. "To my mind" said Mr. Priestland this morning, "there is no other theory that will hold water at all, Nellie was an experienced traveller, and I should feel perfectly at ease if I only knew where she had gone, as she has been away from home so often before and was well accustomed to looking after herself.

"There is absolutely no reason why she should go away like this without letting anyone know her destination. At home we did not know that she contemplated coming west for Easter, but there is nothing at all surprising in her wishing to pay us a surprise visit. She has done this before, and I am confident that that was her intention when she left her room on University street. Had she wanted to go away on a protracted visit there was absolutely nothing to prevent her doing so. She was her own mistress in this regard and could have done exactly as she wanted to. It is my opinion that she has been lured somewhere or other, on the pretext that someone wanted to consult her about the sewing machine she represented here, and that she is being detained against her will in this city.

"The theory that some love entanglement is at the bottom of the mystery is absurd to me. My daughter was not of the sentimental type, but a woman of business and very much interested in her work. The landlady with whom she lived tells me that outside of one gentleman friend she had few men among her acquaintances."

Montreal, April 19.—Word has been received at detective headquarters that Miss Ellen Priestland, who disappeared from Montreal some weeks ago, was seen at Charlottetown, P. E. I., and later at Mancton, N. B. A letter giving information of her whereabouts was received from a commercial traveller, who said: I went over on the same boat with her to Charlottetown, P. E. I., on Saturday, March 26. She took a train that I was on at Kensington on Thursday, March 31st, and came to Charlottetown. The last place I saw her was at Mancton, N. B., when she was at the Brunswick Hotel on Sunday, April 3, arriving there on Saturday night. She registered under her own name. She told me she was appointing agent for the Standard Sewing Machine Co., and seemed to know Montreal well.

Obituary

The Late Thomas Priest.

After a brief illness of only three or four days duration, Mr. Thomas Priest passed peacefully away on the 13th inst. at the home of his son, James A. Priest, Rockford, in the 88th year of his age.

Deceased was out and around on Saturday as well as usual, but was taken ill on Saturday night with kidney trouble and in spite of medical aid and all that kind friend could do he gradually grew worse and passed away to his rest on Wednesday afternoon at the ripe old age of 88 years and 13 days. He suffered little and the end came without a struggle.

The funeral took place on Friday afternoon last, a short service being conducted at the home of his son James, by the Rev. J. W. Kitching, after which the funeral cortege proceeded to St. Paul's church, Jarvis, where a more lengthy ceremony was conducted by an old and esteemed pastor of the deceased, Rev. John Francis, of Dunn. After the ceremony the remains were interred in the family plot surrounded by all the remaining children and some of the grandchildren.

The six sons acted as pallbearers. The relatives and friends have the sympathy of the community in their sad bereavement.

The deceased was born at Cattae Magnet, county of Yorkshire, near the city of York, England, on the first day of April, 1822. He spent his childhood and worked with his father and brothers at the brick and tile business at that place until 23 years of age.

At the age of 21 he married Mary Golden of the city of York and in the year 1845 with his wife and one child he set sail for Canada. The voyage at that time was made in a sailing vessel and after a successful voyage of one month they landed at Halifax and from thence they came to Toronto and he again engaged in the brick and tile business near that place, and the same year came to the county of Halton, Township of Nasagweya and worked in the harvest fields for a Mr. Finlay, a wealthy farmer of that place. He then moved to Campbellville and kept hotel until the year 1849 when he came with his family to the Township of Walpole and settled near Hulleville, now known as Garnet, which was at that time a dense forest, roaming with wild beasts, and started in to make himself a home. With hard work, perseverance and economy, he succeeded in clearing two farms, the one now owned by Mr. Sam Cherry and the other by Mr. George Dales.

By his first marriage they were blessed by eleven children and on the 20th of April he was bereft of his wife and left with his family.

In the year 1870 he was married to Susannah Hull, widow of the late Richard Hull, by the Rev. John Francis of Jarvis, who after a lapse of forty years performed the last sad rites that any mortal can render to the dead.

In the year 1874 he moved on the John Rodgers farm, on the 11th con. of Walpole, now owned by Mr. John Philipps, and worked this farm 20 years. In 1888 he moved on the Harry Pearson farm near Rockford and in the year 1899 he retired from farming and purchased a house and lot from Mr. Martin Cook at Rockford and lived there until the fall of 1905 when he purchased a house and lot from Mr. Jonathan Porter of Jarvis.

On Jan. 1st, 1908, he was bereft of his second wife, since that time he has lived with his sons, Marshall of Jarvis and James of Rockford, until death called him home on Wednesday last.

Deceased was a life long conservative in politics, and a member of St. Paul's church, Jarvis. During his long life he made many friends and was not known to have an enemy.

Out of a family of sixteen children only seven survive him, six sons and one daughter, Mrs. William Harris of Hagersville, Thomas of Happersell, Walter of Appleby, Henry and Charles of Hamilton, Marshall of Jarvis and James of Rockford.
