### Village Fathers Meet.

Jarvis, April 12th, 1910. The Council met pursuant to adjournment. The members all present. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

The Committee appointed to arrange the arrears of license money and adjust the assets with the Township of Walpole reported as follows:—All accounts were settled in full as per copy of receipt filed. The arrears of license money being \$280; Jarvis share of assets of the township \$45; Total \$325, and this amount was paid over to the Village Treasurer.

Moved by Messrs. Lewis and Burwash, that J. B. McMicken be appointed caretaker of the fire engine, ladders, hose, pails, etc., he to be paid according to service rendered.—Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Lewis and Burwash, that the Clerk order 50 dog tags as per design, to be numbered from 29 to 70.—Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Allen and Holmes, that the Reeve issue his checks for the following accounts:—T. E. Morrow, 10c; Municipal World, supplies 54c; J. R. Seatter, Minute Books, \$1.40.

The Treasurer reported that he had received \$5.40 for crushed stone purchased from Police Village.

Moved by Messrs. Burwash and Lewis, that Councillor Holmes be authorized to procure a cupboard suitable to hold the books in the Council Chambers.

Moved by Messrs. Allen and Holmes, that this Council do now adjourn to meet again on the 26th inst.—Carried.

Holbrook—Roulston, Resolved that a bridge over the Nanticoke Creek at Nanticoke and that the Reeve and J. R. Pond be a committee to look after the same.—Carried.

Roulston—Falls, Resolved that a bridge be built on 14th Concession just east of Sprangvale and that the Reeve and S. G. Holbrook be a Committee to look after the same.—Carried.

Roulston—Falls, Resolved that a bridge be built on the Cheapside side road about one mile north of Cheapside and the Reeve and James Falls be a Committee to look after the same.—Carried.

Roulston—Holbrook, Resolved that this Council pay the Treasurer of the Village of Jarvis the sum of three hundred and five dollars being the amount of license money and their share of the assets, which it was mutually agreed by the Council of that Township of Walpole and the Council of the Village of Jarvis was due said village of Jarvis.—Carried.

Roulston—Falls, That whereas the Trustees of S. S. No. 1 have applied to borrow \$4000 by the issue of debentures repayable in 15 years at 5 per cent. Resolved that the Clerk be authorized to prepare a by-law and that it be now read a first time.—Carried.

Pond—Falls, Resolved that the by-law be now read a second time.

Holbrook—Falls, Resolved that the by-law be now read a third time, passed, signed, numbered and entitled as in the original motion.—Carried.

Roulston—Holbrook, Resolved that this Council grant 250 yards of crushed stone to R. D. 119 and the same quantity to R. D. 122. These Divisions agree to do the greater part of the hauling free of cost to the Township.—Carried.

Holbrook—Roulston, Resolved that we do now adjourn to meet on May 21st at 10 a.m. for Court of Revision of the Assessment Roll and for other business of the Township.—Carried.
