The Late William Hewson.
William Hewson, one of the best known and respected residents of Jarvis passed quietly away from this life on Sunday, April 17th. The late Mr. Hewson was born in Walpole, Dec. 13th, 1846.

In 1870 he married Sarah Aude, eldest daughter of the late James Aude, by which union they had four children, Mrs. James Sharp, Mrs. J. S. Burwash, Jarvis; James Hewson of Scranton, Penn., and F. M. Hewson of this village.

Most of Mr. Hewson's life was spent in Walpole, the last twenty-four years in Jarvis. For a short time he lived in Walsingham, Norfolk Co.

The funeral, which was held on Wednesday, April 20th at Knox church, was largely attended. The pallbearers were—Messrs. J. A. Burwash, E. F. Jones, C. G. Allen, L. Miller, James Whitwell and T. E. Morrow.

Owen Sound, April 22.—George Boyd, a Toronto man who was breaksman on the C. P. R. way-freight which left here this morning at 7 o'clock, was instantly killed at Chatsworth, 12 miles from here.

He was caught between two cars while trying to couple them. The draw-heads caught him on the chest and crushed him instantly. His right arm was broken. Dr. Bull, coroner, of Holland Centre, will hold an inquest this afternoon.

Mr. Boyd and his wife removed to Owen Sound from Toronto only one week ago. He was 35 years of age.
