Obituary.

The news of the death of Mr. Edward Bowman which occurred at his home in Walpole on Friday occasioned general regret and sorrow. He had been in poor health for some months so that his death was not unexpected. He was in his 79th year.

Edward Bowman was born at Nottingham, England in 1831 and came to Canada when ten years of age. With his parents he came to Toronto and proceeded by way of Caledonia, accompanied by a band of surveyors, who cut a road through the bush as they travelled, until they reached the lot upon which he resided up to the time of his death. Mr. Bowman was one of the early pioneers and endured his share of the hardships which befell the early settlers. By industry and perseverance he accumulated a competence. Mr. Bowman had a pleasant disposition and made friends rapidly and these he retained by his honesty, integrity and sterling qualities. He was also public-spirited and served four years as a Councillor in Walpole and later was elected Reeve, a position he retained for three years with credit to himself and advantage to the Township. In politics he was a staunch Conservative and chairman of his division for several years. He was a consistent and valued member of the Methodist church.

In 1881 he re-visited his old home in England, returning more favorably impressed than ever with his adopted country.

He had four brothers, Samuel, William, Robert and John, all of whom pre-deceased him. Of two sisters, one died some years ago and the other, is living at Clare, Mich. A widow and six children survive, all of whom were present at his death, except Amos who is at present in Vancouver.

The funeral on Monday last was largely attended, the interment taking place in the family plot at Greenwood cemetery. Rev. S. J. Kelly officiated at the church and at the grave.—Hagersville News.
