### Junior Matriculation Results.

The junior matriculation examinations have been issued. The following list contains the names of three classes of candidates, arranged in three separate groups—A, B and C—under each country.

Passed in Eleven Subjects.

In group A are given the names of all candidates who have obtained complete junior matriculation by passing on the eleven required examination papers, which are as follows:—English composition, English literature, history (ancient and British Canadian), algebra, geometry, Latin authors, Latin composition, together with the four papers in two of the following subjects: Experimental sciences (physics and chemistry), French (authors and composition), Greek (authors and composition).

Passed in Eight at Least.

In group B are given the names of those who have passed in at least eight of the papers required for complete matriculation. They have, therefore, failed in not more than three of the required papers. The papers in which these candidates have failed will be shown on their certificates. They may complete matriculation by passing in all the remaining papers at one subsequent examination.

Passed in All Subjects.

In group C are given the names of those who have written upon any number of matriculation papers less than the eleven required for complete matriculation and who have passed on all papers upon which they have written. In this list will be found the names of successful candidates who have written only on those papers required for matriculation into the faculty of applied science or into the Ontario College of Pharmacy.

Normal Entrance.

Normal entrance candidates who were also candidates for matriculation have been considered in the above results. The names of such candidates, if successful in obtaining complete matriculation, are included in group A. Candidates who have failed on Normal entrance papers, but who have passed in the additional matriculation papers taken are reported in group C.

Apply to Principals.

The certificates of the successful candidates and the statements of marks of those who failed will be sent to the Principals of the high schools and collegiate institutes, or to the public school inspectors, in about a week. Candidates will apply to these officials, not to the department, for the reports in detail.

### Heavy Immigration.

Seven months of immigration have brought 160,000 new people into Canada, chiefly, of course, to the West. 90,000 of these came from the United States—as many as came during the whole of 1909. That so many have come this year, is an effective answer to the campaign lies of the clique of railroad men and land agents with interests in the Southwestern States. These men have tried to stem the tide of immigration to Canada by fantastic stories of summer snowstorms here and of armies of settlers returning to the land of their birth, the States. Figures obtained from authoritative sources, show that exactly 313 settlers have returned to the United States this year, and if it were possible to find out what sort of persons these are, there is no doubt they would be shown to be of the sort that fit as easily in one direction as another. The West is well rid of this sort, and well pleased with the 175,000 settlers of the solid, substantial type, who have crossed from the States to stay here and prosper.

### Kills His Child.

Dimondale, Mich., Aug. 12.—Starting his team again after allowing it to rest before covering the last bit of road to his barns, John R. Cogswell, who lives three miles south of here, heard a childish scream, felt the heavily loaded wagon crush its wheels into some object, and leaped from his seat to find his 4-year-old daughter crushed to death.

Cogswell had just returned from a trip to Dimondale, where he had purchased a load of coal. Upon reaching home he had stopped the team and entered the house for a moment. The child was playing in the yard at the time, and it is believed that she was attempting to climb up the wheel spokes when her father, who was on the other side of the wagon, started the team.
