Western Fair Buildings.

Being Prepared for Great Exhibition.

These are busy days at the Exhibition Grounds, London, where a number of workmen under the Superintendent, Mr. James H. Brown, are preparing the buildings and grounds for the Exhibition which is now only a few weeks off. The new Building for Cement Machinery and similar exhibits is completed and is a model Exhibition Building. The space in it is all allotted long ago. The Machinery Hall has been re-blocked and is now solid and in first class condition. Changes have also been made in the Horticultural and Agricultural Building which will improve them both for exhibitors and visitors. The Dairy Building will be greatly changed; the high framework in the centre has been removed which adds greatly to the appearance of the Building. This, in addition to the fine front for the Cheese Exhibit, makes this Building an ideal one. The greatest changes will be made in the Main Building. The Art Annex of former years has been changed into a "Made in London" Exhibition, where the Manufacturers of London will have an opportunity of showing to the thousands of visitors the finished articles of their own production. The Art Exhibit and Decorated China will be provided for in the Main Building Gallery. The management, with Mr. Wm. Moore as Chairman, of this department are determined that this part of the Exhibition will be away in advance of anything ever seen before at any previous Western Fair. All information regarding the Exhibition will be promptly given on application to the Secretary. The dates are September 9th to 17th.

Florence Nightingale Dead.

London, Aug. 14.—Florence Nightingale, the famous organizer of nursing in the Crimean war, died to-day.

Although she had been an invalid for a long time, rarely leaving her room, where she passed the time in a half-recumbent position, and was under the constant care of a physician, her death was somewhat unexpected. A week ago she was quite sick, but then improved, and on Friday was cheerful. During that night alarming symptoms developed, and she gradually sank until 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, when an attack of heart failure brought the end.

Miss Nightingale celebrated her ninetieth birthday on May 12 last, on which occasion King George sent her warm congratulations, and from every part of the British Empire kind thoughts were wafted to the veteran Queen of Nurses.

Miss Nightingale was the only woman upon whom the Order of Merit had been conferred, and the second woman to receive the freedom of the City of London. No other subject of the King was so tenderly enshrined in the hearts of the people as was the heroine of the Crimea.

Few Teachers.

The scarcity of school teachers is being felt in Lincoln County to a worse degree than ever. On Monday eight schools in this county owing to the inability of the boards to secure a teacher were unable to open their doors. "When the peach supply is scarce the price generally goes up," said one retired schoolmaster to-day, "but not so with those who cultivate the minds of the growing children." The possibilities of other callings are proving too attractive for many qualified teachers.

A mammoth puff ball was on exhibition on Monday in the show window of the E. H. Jackson Co.'s drug store, which attracted considerable attention. It measured 60 inches in circumference and was brought to town by Dr. A. T. Siller, who found it near Selkirk, in Walpole.—British Canadian.
