### Moir Captured.

William Alexander Moir, the murderer of Corporal Lloyd, the London soldier, was captured about 7 miles northwest of Niagara Falls, on Saturday afternoon by Provincial Officers Pay, Kelley and McNamara. Moir was working on the farm of John Burton, on the Ravine road, about one mile north of St. David. He made slight resistance, and is now in his old quarters in the Hamilton asylum.

The arrest was effected about 5 o'clock in the afternoon, following information given to Chief Mains, of the Frontier police force, Niagara Falls, by two men who said that they thought that the man they had seen working on the Burton farm was Moir. Just one hour after Moir had been placed under arrest, Fred McCullough and Monteith Trapnell, two attendants at the asylum, were taken into custody by detectives Coulter and Bleakley. McCullough was arrested at the asylum at 5 o'clock, and it is said, gave the officers certain information in regard to the case which led to the arrest of Trapnell one hour later.

Dr. English said that Detective Miller had told him to watch Trapnell but to give him every opportunity to do his work, and added: "If either one is guilty of the charge of assisting in the escape I think Trapnell was the man who engineered it and McCullough was the tool."

From the first Trapnell was suspected by the superintendent of the asylum. That the detective was right in his theory and his idea of allowing him liberty is evident, for it was not afterwards that the man produced tools which he claimed Moir had used. Those tools were not in the place where Trapnell found them when the detective made his search.
