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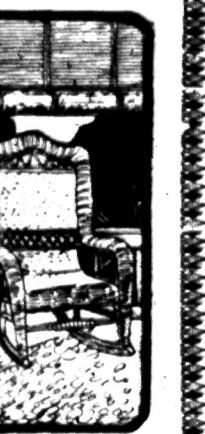

The Council met pursuant to adjournment. All members were present. Reeve J. J. Parsons presiding. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

County Council.

24th August, 1910

The Council met pursuant to the call of the Warden.

All members were present except Messrs. Secord and Robertson.

Minutes of former meeting were read.

Parsons-Bain.—That the minutes be adopted as read.—Carried.

McQuillin.—That the By-law appoint a physician for the House of Refuge be read a second time.—Carried.

Parsons-Bain.—That the By-law to appoint a physician for the House of Refuge for Haldimand be read a third time, passed, signed, sealed, numbered as in the original motion.—Carried.

Anderson-McQuillin.—That the Council hereby authorize Mr. Snider to have the form of instructions printed for the instruction of County Constables as submitted by him.—Carried.

Roulston-Pyle.—That the bill to fix the salary of the physician for the House of Refuge be read a second time.—Carried.

Anderson-Young.—That the bill to fix the salary of the physician for the House of Refuge be read a third time, signed by the Warden and Clerk and numbered as in the original motion.—Carried.

McQuillin-Pyle.—That we adjourn to meet at 1.30 p. m.—Carried.

Shaver-Roulston.—That the physician of the House of Refuge be permitted to order such medical supplies as he deems necessary for the House of Refuge, and that the Clerk is hereby instructed to notify the physician to that effect.—Carried.

Smith-Young.—That this Council do now adjourn to let the several committees meet.—Carried.

Roulston-Pyle.—That the report of the Road and Bridge Committee be received and read.—Carried.

To the County Council.

Gentlemen.—The Road and Bridge Committee beg leave to recommend the following report: That John Walsh be paid for 9 loads of gravel for approaches to Cayuga Bridge, amount \$4.50.

We would also recommend that the last pier to the Cayuga bridge be eased at a cost of \$75.00, reduction of \$100.00.

Also to let down and widen the swing bridge to a width of 16 feet, all of which we think with the figures as follows will be inside of our estimates.

We found a balance of \$200.00 after the above work will be completed.

We may over run our estimates by \$25.00 to complete all work, also the Treasurer be instructed to pay for work done by an order signed by the Chairman of the Road and Bridge Committee.

The Home Committee report as follows:—

To the Warden and Members.—Have examined the accounts of the manager of the House of Refuge and then correct as follows, amounting in all to \$181.60; vouchers filed with accounts presented.

McQuillin-Shaver.—That the report of the Home Committee be adopted as read.—Carried.

Pyle-McQuillin.—That the report of the Building Committee be received and read.—Carried.

To the Warden and gentlemen of the County Council:—

Your Building Committee beg leave to report as follows:—

1. Your committee met in Dunnville on the 18th of July and after going over the House of Refuge with the architect decided to accept the building and pay

the contractor the balance of the contract price, with the exception of five hundred dollars, which we thought advisable to retain as there is still work to be done to the value of one hundred and fifty dollars.

2nd. The contract to lay a two-inch galvanized iron water pipeline across the County property to the House of Refuge and to the barn was given to Haney & Pringle; main line \$145, to stables \$45.00; this work has been completed and town water is now on tap throughout the building and also in the stables.

3rd. We would recommend that a new roof be put on the coal shed at the Registry office.

4th. We also recommend that the Building Committee be authorized to erect a building on the County Farm at Dunnville for the purpose of storing implements, etc.

Respectfully submitted.—W. Bain, Chairman.

McQuillin-Pyle.—That the report of the Building Committee be adopted as read.—Carried.

Pyle-McQuillin.—That the Council of the County of Haldimand thank Mr. M. Nellie, Clerk of the County of Victoria, for his kindness in advising this Council as to the proper books to be procured and accounts to be kept in connection with the House of Refuge, and that a copy of this resolution be sent him, and that the Clerk ask him what charge, if any he has against this County for his services.—Carried.

Cline-Walton.—That the By-law to lay pipe across Caledonia Bridge be read a first time.—Carried.

Young-Smith.—That the By-law for Crossing bridge at Caledonia, Port Colborne and Welland Gas pipe line be read a second time.—Carried.

Anderson-Pyle.—That the By-law crossing Caledonia bridge by Port Colborne and Welland Gas Company be read a third time, signed and sealed and numbered, as in the original motion.—Carried.

McQuillin-Shaver.—That the Building Committee be instructed to build a stable on the County Farm for winter feed for stock as we have about 12 acres of good corn on the farm this year.—Lost.

Yea—Walton, Smith, Young, Pyle, McQuillin, Shaver.

Nay—Cline, Smelser, Parsons, Bain, Anderson, Roulston, Avery.

Smith-Young.—That this Council take action against the Bell Telephone Company in reward to the removal of their poles on the County Bridge at Cayuga.—Carried.

Yea—Walton, Cline, Smelser, Parsons, Bain, Smith, Young, Anderson, Pyle, Shaver, Roulston, Avery.

Nay—McQuillin.

Parsons-Bain.—That a further sum of four thousand dollars be taken up on credit obtained by the County from the Canadian Bank of Commerce in Cayuga and that the Warden and Treasurer sign notes for the same.—Carried.

Cline-McQuillin.—That this County purchase a typewriter for the use of the County Registrar, in the Registry office and that the shipping of the Supply Hall be paid for by purchase the same, and that the typewriter remain the property of the County.—Carried.

Yea—Cline, Shaver, Parsons, Smith, McQuillin, Roulston, Avery.

Nay—Walton, Smelser, Bain, Young, Anderson, Pyle.

Young-Anderson.—That the Home Committee with Mr. Bain, be a committee to such a cistern for the House of Refuge as they deem best.—Carried.

Cline-Walton.—That this Council do now adjourn to meet at the next regular meeting on September 27th.—Carried.

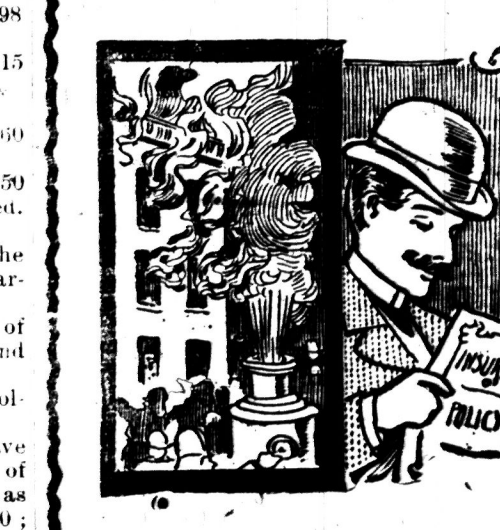
