Owing to the slippery rails and the fact that one side of the engine was disabled, the west-bound freight train on the Wabash was unable to stop at the switch at New Sarum Thursday morning and crashed into the east bound train. As a result the engines were locked together so that it took five hours to pull them apart. Traffic was interrupted during this time. No other damage was done.

The Knox Church S.S. entertainment to be held in Chambers' Hall on the evening of Dec. 21st promises to be of unusual interest this year. A special meeting of the Hamilton presbytery was held in St. Paul's Church, Hamilton on Monday. Rev. D. M. Buchanan of Jarvis was appointed Moderator pro tem. The presbytery declined to sustain the call from Beamsville and Clinton to Rev. D. L. Campbell of Moorefield as it was considered that too small a proportion of the members had signed it. The call from Binbrook and Saltfleet to Rev. C. H. Cooke of Orillia was very unanimous. It being sustained provisional arrangements were made for Mr. Cooke's induction in the event of Mr. Cooke accepting it.

We take the following quotation from a letter to the manager of The Record from Rev. H. J. Harwell, of Port Colborne: "I note by Record many changes in the half year, still I see Jarvis Xmas Fair is to the front, notwithstanding all the bantering of a year ago. I see Homer's health has perceptibly improved and he is able once more to participate in the mysteries of town life, having retired from a strenuous agricultural career. My health has been very good in these parts. My voice much stronger than at Jarvis. The people are most appreciative, at least finances are considerably overpaid, and I get manifold complimentary expressions. Congratulations immense and at my country work they don't remember such crowds."

Municipal Elections
Although the nominations and election days are near at hand there does not seem to be the least excitement in Jarvis or the Township of Walpole.

The Council of Jarvis has been very cautious and has done its work well, and made many improvements in the village which would not have been done had we still remained a Police Village. The taxes have not been raised enough worth mentioning and some claim their taxes are now lower than a year ago. We have not heard of anyone seeking the office of Reeveship or for a Councilorship, and we hope there will be none and that Jarvis' first Council will be re-elected by acclamation on Dec. 25th for a second term. The present Council has been studying the needs of the village for the past year and are now better able to look after the wants of Jarvis than any new Council that could be elected. Elect the present Council by acclamation and save election expenses as well as knowing that you have men in office who will attend to the wants of the village in the very best manner.

The Walpole Council for the past year has been conducting the business of the township in a very business-like manner and the ratepayers, as far as we can learn, have no "kick" at all to make and the most level headed ones wish the old Council to remain at their posts for another year at least.

The Council has this year erected thirteen cement and street bridges and will have to continue to have this class of bridges built for some years to come, as the old wooden structures are fast going to wreck. The Council have also had other heavy expenses to meet but still, as far as we know, the taxes are no higher. We have not heard, as yet, anyone being in the field for the office of Reeve, Deputy Reeve or Councilor, but likely someone will "bob" up in the near future. The election expenses of Walpole are about \$125.00 and think it would be wise of the ratepayers to save this amount by re-electing the old and tried Council of 1910.
