

### Statistics on Live Stock

Ottawa, December 9th, 1910

The report on live stock for the end of November, issued to-day by the Census Office, gives statistics showing for the provinces the per cent. number compared with a year ago, and their condition as compared with a standard condition. For the whole of Canada there is an increase of 3.31 per cent. in the number of horses, of 1.13 in the number of milch cows, of 2.11 in the number of swine, and of 8.02 in the number of poultry. The number of sheep has decreased by 1.55 per cent. in the year, and the number of live stock other than milch cows by 2.20 per cent. The provinces which show the largest gain per cent. in numbers are Saskatchewan and Alberta. Saskatchewan has made a gain of 12.53 per cent. in horses, 4.09 in milch cows, of 6.03 in other horned cattle, of 4.26 in sheep, and of 21.38 in poultry; but the number of swine has fallen off by 5.39 per cent. In Alberta the gain has been 8.59 per cent. in horses, of 1.05 in milch cows, of 13.10 in sheep, of 6.64 in swine and of 22.70 in poultry; while the number of horned cattle other than milch cows has decreased by 6.12 per cent. Prince Edward Island reports small gains for all classes of farm animals the largest being 4.41 per cent. in the number of swine and 3.17 in poultry. Nova Scotia indicates small decreases for horses and swine and small increases for milch cows and other horned cattle and a decrease of 3.30 per cent. in the number of sheep. In New Brunswick there is a decrease of 2.38 per cent. in the number of sheep, and small increases in horses, milch cows and swine. The number of poultry increased in the year by 2.32 per cent. and other horned cattle than milch cows by 4.20 per cent. Quebec presents small increases for horses, milch cows and other horned cattle, and a slight decrease in the per cent of sheep; but the increase in the number of poultry is 3.90 per cent. and of swine 4.10 per cent. In Ontario there are decreases in the number of all farm animals during the year excepting swine, where there is an increase of 6.20 per cent. and poultry, where it is 2.28 per cent. The decrease in horses is 0.45 per cent. in milch cows—0.42, in other horned cattle 12.90, and in sheep 5.02 per cent. Manitoba shows the gain in the number of horned cattle other than swine to be 5.80 per cent. but all other animals are less than a year ago, ranging from 0.45 for poultry to 1.93 for milch cows. British Columbia shows decreases of about 10 per cent. for swine and horned cattle other than milch cows, and of 5 per cent. for sheep, and increases of 2.96 per cent. for horses, 3.78 for milch cows and 15.56 for poultry.

By the standard condition of live stock is meant a healthy and thrifty state; and taking this condition as represented by 100, it is this year a fraction over for horses, milch cows and poultry and a little under for sheep, swine and horned cattle other than cows. In Ontario the condition on all animals exceeded the standard except for sheep, which are 0.05 per cent. below; and in Manitoba where it falls below by 4.36 per cent. for milch cows, by 13.20 for other horned cattle and by 8.36 for swine. On the question whether the supplies of fodder for live stock will suffice for the winter, 89 per cent. of the correspondents give an affirmative answer for hay, 94 per cent. for straw, 53 per cent. for ensilage, 84 per cent. for grain and 61 per cent. for roots; but in the case for ensilage and roots, they are not widely grown in some of the provinces.

The next issue of the Census Monthly will report on the yield, weight and market prices of field crops for the year.

### Abolish Fee System

There is a move on foot throughout the province to have the fee system in connection with the county constabularies and other county officials abolished and a salaried man appointed with head office in the county town. There is talk also that an act will be likely passed at the next sitting of the Legislature doing away with the whole fee system and placing every office of the crown in each county on a straight salary. At their December session at Chatham the Kent County Council took up the question of inefficiency of the county constabulary, with a view to improving it. At present the system of constabulary in the county is pronounced useless and expensive. An effort will be made to abolish the fee system for constables, and to appoint an officer for each township, under salary, with the head office at Chatham. At present the remuneration is too small and uncertain. The plan has been suggested, also, to abolish the use of so many J.P.'s and to appoint one magistrate under a salary, who will travel from place to place through the county trying cases. The matter will be considered by a committee.

### Mr. Wigg has Passed Away

Mr. E. S. Wigg, the popular County auctioneer, died at his home this morning after an illness of three days. On Monday forenoon he was found in the hay-mow of his livery stable, on his hands and knees, looking for his false teeth. He had apparently been in a semi-conscious condition for some time, but when first discovered he could speak indistinctly, and gave those who found him to understand that he had had a fall. After being removed to his home the seizure was pronounced paralysis and he gradually sank into insensibility. During the two following days he continued to become weaker, and died at noon to-day without regaining consciousness. His death has cast a gloom over the town as he was one of the best known men in Cayuga and the County of Haldimand and had always a kindly word of greeting for all. The sympathy for his bereaved widow and son is widespread and most sincere and the Advocate joins in the universal condolence being expressed. The late Mr. Wigg was born at Beamsville in 1846 and moved to Cayuga with his parents when about six years of age. He was married about 37 years ago to Margaret Fulton, who with their one son, Frederick W., survived. For over 20 years he drove the stage between Caledonia and Cayuga and nearly 20 years ago he purchased the livery business which he conducted faithfully and well up to the time of his death. He has also conducted a very successful auctioneer business for the past 35 years. In filling the positions of stage driver and auctioneer he came in close touch with the public and kind, jolly "Jake" Wigg was known and esteemed from one end of the County to the other. Perhaps no man in Haldimand would be more missed in passing to the beyond, as he occupied a place of his own in the hearts of the people with whom he came in contact. It has been noticed by his friends that his health was failing during the past year but his sudden illness and death came as a shock to all. Besides his bereaved widow and son he leaves a number of sisters and brothers, to mourn his loss, namely, Thomas, of Cayuga, William of Hamilton Mrs. Humphrey of Caledonia, Mrs. Baker of Buffalo, and Mrs. J. Hines of North Cayuga. The funeral will take place on Sunday from his late home at 2 o'clock p. m. Interment will be made in the Cayuga cemetery.—Cayuga Advocate.
