Farm Help Needed.

The Ontario Department of Colonization claims to have a vigorous kick coming in reference to the treatment of this Province by the Federal Department of the Interior, which will probably find official ventilation before the end of the present session. Under the existing Government arrangement each Province pays to the Federal Department a certain sum for colonization and immigration. Of the total Ontario's share is nearly one-half.

Recently the Federal Department of the Interior issued a series of descriptive booklets dealing with opportunities in the individual Provinces. The other eight Provinces have had issued on their behalf well bound and handsomely illustrated publications, with color plates and other attractive features while those of Ontario are merely small booklets without binding, in black and white, and resembling, to use the words of Mr. Donald Sutherland, Provincial Director of Colonization, "the proofs of a careless printer." In addition, the Ontario booklet deals only with Thunder Bay and the Rainy River District.

The Provincial Department of Colonization is besieged with requests for farm help, particularly from the dairy farms of old Ontario. Immigration for this purpose has practically ceased, and the most effective aid the Province requires is along this line, which is ignored in the Federal literature.

Lady Captured Burglar.

Buffalo, N. Y., Jan. 27.—Mrs. M. A. Statler, 70 years old, and Mrs. Bama Bailittz captured a burglar this afternoon after a struggle in which both women were injured. They live in an apartment at the Marguerite on Carolina street. This afternoon Mrs. Bailittz answered a ring at the door. She was confronted by a man with a revolver and fled toward a window screaming for help. The man, who followed her, first encountered Mrs. Statler. Grasping the old woman by the throat, he choked her until she fainted.

Unable to attract attention and desperate from fear that her mother was being murdered, Mrs. Bailittz picked up a vase and hurled it at the intruder. She followed up the attack and the man fled. He ran across the street into a saloon, but, finding a number of men there, immediately ran out. Mrs. Bailittz grabbed him as he came out of the saloon door and began to cry for help. The fellow bit her hand and arm until the blood came, but she hung on until two men came to her aid.

At the police station the burglar was identified as Raymond Cokley, 22 years old. He served seventeen months at Elmira for burglary and larceny.

Men and Money Too.

Washington, Jan. 28.—More than \$30,000,000 worth of Americans were exported to Canada last year. That at least, is the effect of immigration from the United States to Canada in 1909, according to the report of the United States Consul Constant of Windsor, Ont. The total number of emigrants from the United States for the year was 90,148, and the Canadian Immigration Commissioner has estimated that the average wealth of these American settlers was \$1,000.

There are several reasons advanced by authorities for the large increase of immigration into Canadian territory," says Consul Constant, "but the one given the most credence is the easy manner in which homestead lands can be obtained, and the inducements held out to prospective settlers."
