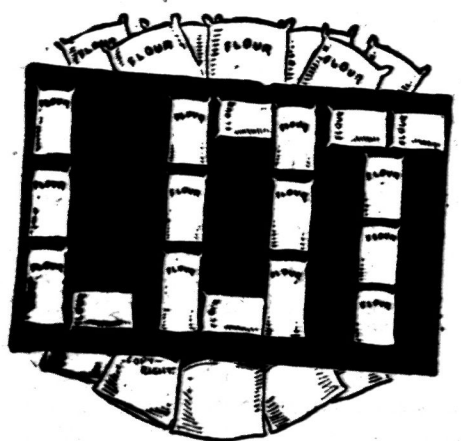

Canadian Forestry Associ- ation

Forestry Convention, Fredericton,
N. B., Feb. 23 and 24, 1910.

Upon the invitation of the Govern-
ment of New Brunswick the
Eleventh Annual Convention of the
Canadian Forestry Association for
the consideration of Forestry prob-
lems will be held in the Legisla-
tive Buildings, Fredericton, N. B.
on Wednesday and Thursday, Feb.
23rd and 24th. The sessions will
be opened at 10 a. m. on the 23rd by
addresses from the representatives
of the Government, Municipal, Ed-
ucational, and Commercial institu-
tions etc.

It is expected that the President,
Mr. Thomas Southworth of Toronto,
will preside and the following have
already signified their intention of
taking part: Hon. Clifford Sifton,
Chairman of the Commission of
Conservation; Hon. Jules Allard,
Ministers of Lands and Mines, Que-
bec; Hon. W. C. H. Grimmer, Sur-
veyor General of New Brunswick;
Dr. B. E. Fernow, Dean of the Fac-
ulty of Forestry, University of Tor-

The department of Agriculture at
Ottawa reports the total wheat cro-
of Canada last year to be 166,744,000
bushels, averaging 21 1/2 bushels per
acre, with an average market value
of 84 4-5 cents per bushel, thus ag-
gregating for the whole crop \$141,-
320,000. In 1908 the crop was 112,-
424,000 bushels, averaging 17 bush-
els per acre, with an average market
value of 81 1-10 cents per bushel,
aggregating for the whole crop \$91,-
232,000.
