Nova Scotia Takes Measures to Get Accurate Estimate.

The province of Nova Scotia durng the past summer inaugurated a surveyor its forest lands, thus setting an example to the other provinces of the Dominion in this regard. The southwestern part of the province, from Hants county westward, was covered this past summer and it is expected the survey will be completed next summer.

Conditions allowed of only a rough survey, or "reconnaissance." The survey was carried out under the direction of Dr. B. E. Fernow. dean of the faculty of forestry of nerveousness. billiousness. constitrained foresters, along with the Chief Fire Warden of the province. were employed on the survey, and under the plan of operations adopted each of these was assigned a certain district and allowed considerable liberty in his choice of the method of covering this to the best advantuge, Existing records and other information secured with the digestive juices.

The information obtained was plotted in the field directly on maps of large scale (2 inches to the mile) provided far the purpose. Among the points of greatest importance thus noted were the extent of the burned areas, the conditions of the reproduction and the character of farming lands, meadows, etc., within the farming country.

The cost of the survey is a point of considerable note, as it averged less than twenty cents per square mile. The total area of the country covered was about 8500 square

The future of the forest is the point of greatest interest to the forester, and in this regard Dr. Fernow has some interesting observations to make.
