## On The Up Grade Still.

Ottawa, Jan. 7.—The total Dominion's revenue for December was \$8,733,572 an increase of \$1,550,216, or over twenty per cent. compared with December of 1908. For the nine months the revenue has been \$73,390,080, an increase of \$11,091,497. The increase in the Customs revenue has been \$9,361,421.

The expenditure, on the other hand, shows for the nine months a decrease of \$3,390,080 on consolidated fund account, and of \$2,250,206 on capital account. The total expenditure on consolidated fund account was \$3,398,129, and on capital account \$24,026,137, of which about seventeen millions was on the National Transcontinental Railway.

During December the net debt of the Dominion decreased by \$690,658, and now stands at \$322,283,079.

## Slipped From Freight Car and Died in Hospital.

Ice on the top of a freight car indirectly caused the death of Charles Pearson, aged 27, of St. Thomas, when he fell under a train in the Streetsville yards Friday.

Pearson, a brakeman on Canadian Pacific freight train No. 54, tried to cross from the first car of the train to the tender of engine No. 655, which was pulling the train. As he jumped his foot slipped and he fell between the engine and car. His efforts to grab something proved ineffectual, and he landed with his legs across the track. The front wheels of the moving car caught him before he could move. Several cars passed over him.

Both legs were terribly mangled, and he lost much blood before first aid was rendered. His right leg was nearly severed and terribly mangled close to the hip, and his left was crushed to a pulp between the knee and the ankle. He was brought to Toronto on Train No. 12, arriving at 3.10, and attended at the Western Hospital. He died at 2.30 p.m.

Pearson leaves a widow and two children in St. Thomas. His mother came to Toronto last night.

Coroner S. Singer opened an inquest at the hospital, and after viewing the remains adjourned.

Before going into the employ of the Canadian Pacific Pearson worked for the Michigan Central Railway. He was on his second trip for the C. P. B.

## Death Claims Two.

Winnipeg, Jan. 7.—Sad indeed has been the fate of the Kavanaugh family, who gathered in a reunion on New Year's Day in an unbroken circle. During the festivities the aged father of the family was stricken with pneumonia and removed to the hospital, almost direct from the party. Yesterday the son in whose house the gathering was held was killed in a collision in the C. P. R. yards, and to-day the old man died without knowing his son had perished. He is in a state of utter collapse and his life is despaired of as a result of grief and shock.

Collins Handy, father of the Canadian bean-growing industry, died at Highgate on Jan. 9 in his 96th year.

## VERY FINE BIRDS.

## EATING AN APPLE.
