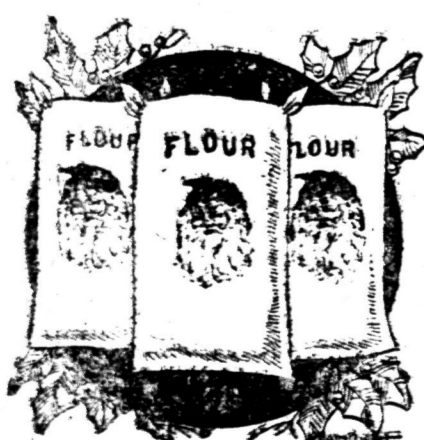

County Has a Surplus.

That the Haldimand County Council has managed its business satisfactorily this year is shown by the statement prepared by T. A. Snider, Clerk and Treasurer. On Jan. 1st the net debt of the County was \$3133.32. It now owes the High Schools \$5278.14, and the December criminal justice and other accounts \$1909, a total of \$6278.14. It has cash in hand of \$1182.12, county rate not paid in \$1905.63, and other sums owing \$1076.64, a total of \$7164.45. This makes the surplus at this date \$886.31, a betterment during the year of \$4019.63.

This has been accomplished notwithstanding that the county rate was \$308.60 less than in the year previous, that \$2074.87 was spent on roads and bridges more than was contemplated, and there was a new expenditure of \$240 for insurance of the House of Refuge, and that the expenditure for insurance, light and heat exceeded the estimate by the sum of \$328.65.
