Knox Church Annual Meeting.

The Annual Meeting of Knox Church was held last Wednesday evening and there was a good attendance of members and adherents. The reports from the different branches of the church work showed that during the past year good work had been done and substantial progress had been made. Rev. D. M. Buchanan acted as chairman and also presented the report of the Session. In presenting the Session's report the pastor reviewed the work of the church since the beginning of his pastorate in 1904. It showed that, although the congregation had suffered a great many losses through deaths and removals, yet the additions to the membership during the past five years had more than counter balanced these losses, and had resulted in an increase in the membership so that the number on the Communion Roll at the close of 1909 was larger than at any previous time. The additions to the membership during the past year was fourteen. The Sunday school reports also showed an increase in the attendance from 70 in 1905 to 94 in 1909. The total contributions to Missions last year were more than double what they were five years ago. Since the beginning of Mr. Buchanan's pastorate in 1904 there has been expended \$1029 in repairing and improving the church property, of which amount the Ladies Aid Society had provided \$380.

The Treasurer of the congregation, Mr. A. J. Fallis, presented the report of the Board of Managers. His report showed that after all accounts were paid for the past year there remained a balance of \$169 in the treasury. Hearty votes of thanks were passed for the Treasurer and for the Ladies Aid Society for the efficient services they had rendered the congregation. Messrs. Robert Wilson, R. W. Smith, R. O. Dougherty, Neal Brown and John Thompson were elected managers for three years to take the place of the one third of the Board whose term had expired. Messrs. C. G. Allen and George L. Miller were elected auditors.

The financial report showed a balance on hand of \$102.79 which was very encouraging indeed. The following officers were duly elected for the year 1910:

A meeting of the officers and directors of the above named society will be held in the I. O. F. hall on Saturday, Jan. 29th inst. Business of immediate importance is to come up before the meeting and every officer is expected to be present and also any member of the society who may have any business to bring before the meeting.

Village Fathers Meet.

On Tuesday evening, Jan. 18th, the Jarvis Village Council met for the transaction of business. Members all present; the Reeve in the chair. The minutes of the adjourned meeting were read.

Councillor Holmes reported having received the town By-Laws from Simcoe and Caledonia, and a catalogue of blank forms from the Municipal World. He had also ordered a Corporation Seal, which had not yet arrived.

A communication was read from the Grand Trunk Railway Company asking the Council to furnish them with a map of the village and other particulars.

On motion the Clerk was authorized to inform the Company the Council did not possess a map of the New Village of Jarvis, and to give the Company what information he could.

Moved by Messrs. Holmes and Allen, that a By-Law be passed for the appointment of municipal officers. The By-Law was read a first, second and third time and passed, when on motion Mr. C. E. Bourne was appointed Clerk at a salary of \$50 per annum, and Mr. James Noble, Treasurer, without a salary.

Moved by Messrs. Holmes and Lewis, that the Clerk be authorized to procure from the Municipal World the Assessment Roll and other blank forms to be provided by the Council now assembled.—Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Burwash and Holmes that By-Law No. 2, relating to the banking of moneys belonging to the Municipality of the Village of Jarvis, be now read the first time.—Carried.

On motions the above By-Law was read the second and third times and passed.

On motion of Messrs. Holmes and Allen, By-Law No. 3, providing for the removal of snow and ice from the sidewalks in said Village of Jarvis, be read a first time.—Carried.

On motions the above By-Law was read a second and third time and passed.

On motion of Messrs. Holmes and Lewis, that the Clerk and Treasurer be authorized to issue checks for the following accounts: J. C. Sanderson, \$27.54; C. S. McCarter, \$12.00; Andrew Rogers, \$4.00.—Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Allen and Holmes, that Alfred Underhill be appointed pinner and overseer for the village I. P. 1910, he to act under orders of the Reeve, and to receive 15 cents per hour while performing his official duties.—Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Lewis and Allen, that Messrs. Noble and Burwash be a committee to interview Mr. George Miller and see if arrangements can be made to secure his office for a meeting place of this Council.—Carried.

On motion the Council adjourned to meet again on Tuesday evening, Feb'y 1st, at 8.30 o'clock.
