The Ontario Government report as follows—Population of Haldimand 21,589; Births for 1909, 408; Deaths 240. The population of Ontario is given at 2,120,430. The whole number of births in the Province was 53,584; marriages 21,915; deaths 33,502.

Death of John Brock.

There passed away on Tuesday last, the 18th, inst., one of the old pioneer residents of Jarvis in the person of John Brock, who died suddenly at the residence of his eldest son George, near Tyrrell, with whom he has lived for the past two years. Deceased had always enjoyed good health up to a few weeks ago but was able to be up and around as usual. He arose on Tuesday morning as usual but dropped dead only a few minutes later. He was in his 81st year. Deceased was born in Fernamagh County, Ireland, and came to Canada with his parents in 1840 and settled in Scarborough, near Toronto, where he learned blacksmithing. He came to Jarvis in 1852, opening a shop on the premises now occupied by the Union Hotel, and a few years later located on the premises where the Whittaker block now stands, remaining there until a few months before the big fire in 1872 which almost wiped out the village.

After being in business in London for about twenty years he retired from business about five years ago and since that time has lived with his sons.

He was married in 1854 to Elizabeth Ann Forster, daughter of the late George E. Forster of Townsend. Eleven children were born to them, ten sons and one daughter, the youngest, who died when about two years of age. One son, Herbert, died in 1891 at the age of 18 years and nine still survive him. The sons are George and Robert, of Townsend; Frank, in the Yukon; Thomas and Percy, Waterford; John, St. Williams; Charles, Caledonia; Ernest, Philadelphia and Fred, in London. His wife died about two and a half years ago. Deceased was a conservative in politics and a life long member of the Church of England.

Two brothers and one sister survive him—they are Robert, Strathroy; Dr. William, West Lorne, and Mrs. James Secord, East Saginaw, Mich.

The funeral took place on Thursday last to St. Paul's church in this village, the services being conducted by the Rev. Canon Belt, six of the sons acting as pall bearers.

The annual meeting of the Walpole Mutual Fire Assurance Company was held on Saturday last. The meeting was not largely attended owing to bad roads and very disagreeable weather. The officers and directors of 1909 were re-elected for 1910. The annual report was presented and showed that the Company was in a very prosperous condition. During the year 261 risks had been taken, and the amount of risks on them were \$57,523.00. The losses during the year were very light, the amount being only \$586.11. There is on hand over \$8,000.00 and the liabilities are only \$2,000.

Dairymen's Convention.
The Canadian Farm of Jan. 25th, publishes a fine portrait of Mr. J. J. Parsons, the Retiring President of Dairymen's Association of Western Ontario. Mr. Parsons, in his annual address at the convention held in St. Thomas said that there was a large increase in the amount of cheese made and exported during the past year. The exports of butter have decreased by 53,911 packages, but the total amount of butter made has increased. Yet, with all these increases we must not lose sight of the quality, for if the quality goes down we will soon lose our markets. Several new factories have been built, and the Western Ontario output has been greater. There has been a gradual awakening of interest in dairying in Western Ontario, which shows that the dairy farmers know what is good for them.

Knox Church Anniversary.

Notwithstanding the snow blockade on Sunday the attendance at the service of Knox Church Anniversary was good both morning and evening. The Rev. Prof. Ballantyne of the Knox College, Toronto was the preacher for the occasion. The sermons of the learned professor were plain evangelical gospel messages and were thoroughly enjoyed by the large congregations present. As the services in the Methodist church was withdrawn and as Rev. Mr. Harnwell was present at the evening service he was invited by the pastor to take part in the service.

There was an exceptionally large attendance at the tea-meeting and concert on Monday night. The storm of the previous night had passed away so that throughout the day on Monday the roads were opened up thus permitting the people from far and near to drive to Jarvis and participate in Knox church tea-meeting and concert, which has been for many years a popular function in the life of the community. The Ladies of Knox church have a well merited reputation for putting up a good tea at the annual anniversary of the church and on this occasion their reputation was so well sustained that many pronounced it "the best yet." Although the serving of refreshments began at 5.30 the crowd was so large that it was nearly nine o'clock before this portion of the entertainment was over and they were able to begin the concert.

Some ten years ago Mrs. Jessie Alexander Roberts was one of the artists at a Knox church concert. The pleasant recollections of her former visit together with her reputation as a noted elocutionist led all to anticipate that a choice program was in store for them. She rendered several selections in her elegant and popular style and the encores that followed every selection showed how heartily her services were appreciated by the immense crowd that filled every nook and corner of the auditorium.

Mr. Harold Avrey was the soloist for the evening. It was Mr. Avrey's first appearance before a Jarvis audience but his selections were well received and heartily encored. Rev. Mr. McPhail of Cayuga and Rev. Mr. Harnwell gave brief but appropriate and yet interesting addresses. The pastor acted as chairman. The total proceeds amounted to \$286.

Died At Revelstoke.

We take the following from the Nelson, B. C. Daily News of Tuesday, Jan. 18th:
The death occurred at Revelstoke early Sunday morning of Sidney Hobbs, aged 54 years. Mr. Hobbs had lived in Revelstoke about a year, and for fourteen years previously was a resident of Roseland, being a native of Cheepside, Ont. His death was due to cancer, from which he suffered during a lingering illness. The late Mr. Hobbs leaves a wife, a young son and four daughters, three of whom were at his bedside at the time of his death. His daughters are Mrs. Geo. Stevens of Greenwood, Mrs. W. G. Gillett of Nelson, and Mrs. H. H. Gill and Mrs. G. C. Marshall of Roseland. The body arrived in Nelson by last night's coast train, for burial, being accompanied by A. C. Hobbs of Dayton, Wash., a brother of the deceased, Mrs. W. G. Gillett, and Mrs. C. Rodgers of Revelstoke, the latter being a cousin. The funeral, which will be private, will take place at 2.30 o'clock this afternoon, from the undertaking parlors of the Standard Furniture Company.
