Ottawa, July 8.—The financial first quarter of the present fiscal year shows an increased revenue of Toronto on Monday morning. \$4,741,981, as compared with the

For the last month the increase was \$1,633,779. The quarter's revenue totalled \$26,334,853, and the revenue for June \$9,612,677.

Expenditure on consolidated fund account for the three months was \$8,833,107. an increase of only \$16.500. Expenditure on capital account for the quarter totalled \$3,150,035, a decrease of \$864,263.

During June the net debt of the Dominion decreased by \$2,333,467, the debt at the end of the month being \$322,405,328.



Ottawa, July 10.—During the fiscal year which closed with March 31 the people of Canada consumed spirits to the amount of .815 gallon, as compared with ,806 in the fiscal year, a slight increase. The consumption of beer per head was 6,276 gallons, wine .97 gallon, and of tobacco 2.940 pounds.
