Revenue Increased.

Ottawa, July 8.—The financial statement of the Dominion for the first quarter of the present fiscal year shows an increased revenue of \$4,741,981, as compared with the corresponding three months of last year.

For the last month the increase was \$1,633,779. The quarter's revenue totalled \$26,334,853, and the revenue for June \$9,612,677.

Expenditure on consolidated fund account for the three months was \$8,833,167, an increase of only \$16,500. Expenditure on capital account for the quarter totalled \$3,150,085, a decrease of \$864,263.

During June the net debt of the Dominion decreased by \$2,333,467, the debt at the end of the month being \$323,406,328.

Smoking and Drinking.

Ottawa, July 10.—During the fiscal year which closed with March 31 the people of Canada consumed spirits to the amount of .815 gallon, as compared with .806 in the fiscal year, a slight increase. The consumption of beer per head was 6.276 gallons, wine .97 gallon, and of tobacco 2.940 pounds. In the previous year the consumption of beer per head was 2.348 gallons, wine .85 gallon, and of tobacco 2.910 pounds. As compared with thirty years ago, when two gallons of liquor were consumed for every head of population the consumption of spirits in general has been a steady increase in the consumption of beer, and a steady but not abnormal increase in the use of tobacco.
