Canada's Next Census Of Population.

The next census of Canada will be taken under date of June 1st, 1911, and will embrace the subjects of population, mortality, agriculture, manufactures, minerals, fisheries and dairy products.

Population will be recorded under the heads of residence and personal description; citizenship, nationality and religion, profession; occupation and trade or means of living; wage-earning and insurance; education and languages spoken, and infirmities.

Every person living on 1st June will be entered on the schedule of population by name, as member of family, institution or household, together with place of habitation, sex, relationship to head of family or household, and whether single, married, widowed, divorced or legally separated. The month of birth, year of birth and age at last birthday will be recorded.

Entries will be made for each person to show the country or place of birth, year of immigration to Canada if born elsewhere, year of naturalization if formerly or alien, and also racial or tribal origin, nationality and religion. Every person of alien birth who has become a naturalized citizen is a Canadian by nationality; and every British subject with residence in Canada, as well as every native of Canada who has acquired citizenship by birth or naturalization, is also a Canadian by nationality. But there is no Canadian by racial or tribal origin, unless the Indians are so counted.

Every person having an occupation or trade will be entered for it, but if employed in the census year at some other occupation for part or whole time he will be recorded also. If the person is working on own account, the entry will be so made. An entry is also required to be made showing where the person is employed, as on farm, in wooden mill, at foundry shop, in drug store, etc.

Wage-earners are entered to show the number of weeks employed in 1910 at chief occupation; at other than chief occupation if any; the hours of working time per week at chief occupation, or at other occupation if any; the total earnings in 1910 at chief occupation; the total earnings at other than chief occupation; and the rate per hour when employed by the hour.

Entries are required to be made for each person showing the amount of insurance held at date of the census upon life, as well as against accident or sickness, to gether with the cost of such insurance in the census year.

Under the heading of education and language records will be taken for every person of five years of age and over showing the number of months at school in 1910, and if the person can read and write and the language, commonly spoken by each person. The cost of education in 1910 for persons over 16 years of age at College, Convent or University is called for.

The last question on the schedule of population relates to infirmities. It calls for a record of each person having an infirmity. If blind, deaf and dumb, crazy or lunatic, idiotic or silly, a record thereof will be in the proper column, and the age at which the infirmity appeared is required to be specified.

Seed Case.

(T. G. Ranor in Waterford Star.)
Sometimes farmers as well as seed dealers sell low grade red clover seed more or less foul with noxious weeds to their neighbors for seeding purposes and become violators of the seed law. Such a case was up before Magistrate Hooker, of Scotland, on July 4th, when Inspector T. G. Ranor, of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, laid an information against farmer Sylvester, Stratford, of East Oakland, in the Township of Townsend, Norfolk Co., to which the latter pleaded guilty and paid a fine and the costs of the court. Some time in

March the Seed Branch Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, got a notice that an inspector was wanted in Stratford, to which call a response was made and a small quantity of the seed in question was shown the inspector, who looked upon it as suspicious and took an official sample. It was sent to the Dominion seed analyst and reported to contain 6 noxious weed seeds per 1000, mostly rib-grass or buckhorn. As this seed represented a 22 bushel lot and was all sold, it means a large addition to the weeds in the meadows of Brant and Norfolk counties, where the seed was sold. In justice to Mr. Stratford, it may be he was not aware that in selling his neighbors such seed (and they wanted it as the sample of clover was good), that the farmers who bought it in sowing 10 lbs. of it to the acre they would add about 17,400 noxious weeds per acre.

Farmers who are growing seed for sale should remember that they will have to take \$2 to \$3 less per bushel for such seed. It is therefore poor policy to sow weed seeds when they make it pure. All the buckhorn can be separated from the good seed by dampening one or two ply of cheese cloth sewed over sieves so that a layer of infested clover seed shakes off and the buckhorn sticks closer and must be scraped off when the process can be repeated. A day will clean a bushel or more. By sowing clean seed on a clean chance and weeding a little in the field it will be possible to grow pure seed, for which no apology need be made by anyone.

Sixth.—Thou shalt do whatever lieth in thy power to encourage and promote the welfare of thine own town and thine own people.

Seventh.—Thou shalt not suffer the voice of pride to overcome thee and if other towns entice thee consent thou not for thou mayest be deceived.

Eighth.—Thou shalt spend thy earnings at home and they may return from whence they came and give nourishment to such as may come after thee.

Ninth.—Thou shalt not bear false witness against the town wherein thou dwellest but speak well of it to all men.

Tenth.—Thou shalt keep these commandments and teach them to thy children, to the third and fourth generation that they may be made to flourish and grow in plenty when thou art laid to rest with thy fathers.
