The Evaporator and Pickle factory has given considerable work to the people of Jarvis, and has furnished the farmers a place to dispose of their apples and cucumbers at good prices. A vote will be taken on the by-law on June 23rd, and it is to be hoped that the by-law will carry by a large majority.

Village Council.

Jarvis, May 31, 1910.
The Council met pursuant to adjournment. Reeve Smith in the Chair. Members all present.

The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

Moved by Messrs. Allen and Holmes, That this Council do now form itself into a Court of Revision for the purpose of revising the Assessment Roll and hearing any appeals, and that Mr. Burwash be Chairman. Carried.

After the members of the Court had taken the necessary oath it was moved by Messrs. Allen and Holmes that the appeal of Messrs. A. L. and J. F. Smith, complaining of over assessment in their business assessment, be allowed, to conform with the present statute. The change being from 60 per cent to 35 per cent. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Lewis and Holmes, That, all appeals having been heard and considered, the Court of Revision do now adjourn, and the Council resume general business. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Allen and Lewis, That the following accounts be paid and checks issued for the same; J. J. Murray, Cayuga, 12 Tile, \$12.00; F. Heartwell, equalizing rates, S. S. 10, \$3.00; Fred Underhill, to pay gas for street lights, \$61.00; Municipal World, supplies \$1.28. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Lewis and Burwash, That By-law No. 5 regarding dog tax be amended, and that By-law No. 14 regarding the same be now read a first time. Carried.

Said By-law was then read a second and third time, signed sealed and entitled as in the original motion.

Moved by Messrs. Allen and Lewis, That this Council deem it expedient to submit a By-law to the Ratepayers of the Village of Jarvis, for the exemption of Evaporator and Pickle Factory of Messrs. Johnson Bros., from municipal taxes for the period of ten years, according to the proposed By-law, and that the said proposed By-law be printed in the local paper for the time required by statute, and that a poll be held to determine the same on the 23rd of June, 1910. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Burwash and Allen, That this Council do now adjourn to meet again on the 14th of June, 1910. Carried.
