Remains of Tecumseh.

Chatham, June 3.—The town of Wallaceburg is greatly excited today over the discovery of what are claimed to be the remains of Tecumseh, the great ally of Canadians in the war of 1812, who was killed at the battle of Moravian Town. The remains were found on St. Anne's Island in Mitchell's Bay by a party of Wallaceburg people guided by a man named Fisher who said he had received the secret of the burying place from his grandfather, who in turn was informed by an Indian many years ago. For some time Fisher has been claiming that after the battle of Moravian Town Tecumseh's remains, fearing the body would be stolen, had carried it to St. Anne's Island. The secret was carefully guarded and Fisher's grandfather was one of a few who was told of the spot. It has been handed down to Fisher's father and then to him, together with certain documents of proof.

Yesterday, Dr. H. A. Mitchell, Harry Smith and Charles Chubb decided to test the proof of Fisher's statement, and a party went to the island to the spot indicated by the guide. They found a mound and upon digging down found a wooden box. As they started to dig it out the box crumbled to pieces and the bones dropped out. Dr. Mitchell, who examined them, described the bones as those of a large Indian, and from documents held by Fisher he is convinced the remains are those of the great Indian chief. The bones are now in the office of Dr. Mitchell at Wallaceburg.

An Army of 9,000 Men.

Ottawa, June 2.—Nine thousand men will be required to take the census of next year. The schedules of enumeration embodying some changes from the previous forms are now before the Cabinet for approval.

The number of those employed in the work will be very little more than in May 1901, the idea being to make larger areas assigned to each enumerator. Great growth of the West will operate towards an increased representation in the Commons, but this will depend upon the relative increase in Quebec and the east.

At Rest.

A gloom was cast over the village on Sunday when the sad news of the death of Mrs. Joshua Howard was announced. That the worst was expected for several days in no way lessened the regret among all classes of the community, among whom she was held in the utmost esteem. Mrs. Howard had suffered for some time from an internal malady and though everything possible was done she gradually grew weaker and the end came on Sunday. She was in her 66th year.

Fmma Matilda Kennedy was born in Oneida in 1844. In 1869 she was united in marriage to Joshua Howard. After residing in Caledonia for about seven years they moved to Hagersville in 1876 where Mr. Howard engaged in the milling business and where she resided up to the time of her death. Mrs. Howard was a consistent member of All Saint's Church, and took an active interest in all church work. A faithful wife, loving mother, and a good neighbor and friend she will be greatly missed by those who knew and loved her best. Her husband predeceased her two years ago. Four sons and one daughter survive her. They are, Prof. John F., of San Antonio, Texas; H. A. and William, of Toronto; Fred, of San Francisco and Miss Evelyn at home. Mrs. Howard also leaves three sisters and two brothers. They are Mrs. Chaisegreen, St. Thomas; Mrs. James Anderson, McLeod, Montana; Mrs. James Corson, Oneida; Mr. David Kennedy, Clinton, and John, of Goderich. All but John were present at the funeral which took place on Tuesday last. Services were held in All Saints church and the interment took place in the family plot at the Hagersville Cemetery, Rev. Ferguson officiating. The floral offerings were varied and beautiful. Among those attending the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Morse and Mr. and Mrs. I. Smuck, Hamilton; Mrs. M. and Mr. Wm. 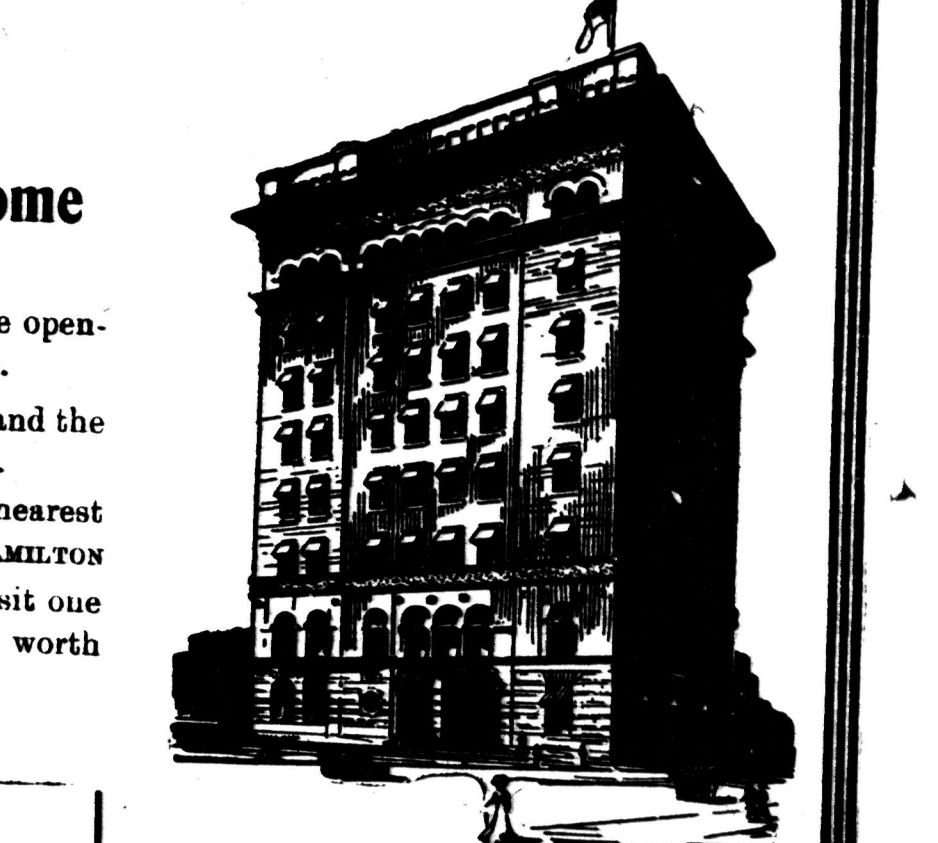
