**BY LAW**

WHEREAS, a request has been received from Messrs. Johnson Bros., of the Village of Jarvis, that the premises used by them as an Evaporator and Pickle factory in the said village be exempted from taxation for a period of ten years.

AND, WHEREAS, it appears to be expedient that such request should be granted, provided, however, that the evaporator be rebuilt, and continue in operation for the term of ten years.

THEREFORE, be it enacted, and it is hereby enacted by the Council for the Municipality of the Village of Jarvis in Council assembled.

The property, consisting of one acre of land and being composed of a part of Lot No. 5 in the eighth concession of the township of Walpole in the Village of Jarvis and being the property occupied and used by the said Johnson Bros., as an evaporator and pickle factory, etc., and the same is hereby exempted from all municipal taxation with the exception of taxes for school purposes for and during the term of ten years from the first day of June, A. D. 1910.

PROVIDED, That this by-law shall receive the consent of a majority of those voting thereon at a special poll to take place at the Temperance Hall on the 23rd day of June, 1910, A. D.
