### County Council.

Cayuga, June 1, 1910.

Council met pursuant to adjournment at the call of the Warden.

All the members of Council were present.

The following communications were read:—

May 11th, 1910, Legislative Assembly; May 16th, From the Warden; May 30th, Department of Education; May 30th, Department of Agriculture; May 30th, Conference of Charities; May 31st, Major Williamson; May 31st, Clark Moses; May 31st, Hon. J. Baxter.

The following Committee on Communications was appointed: Robertson, MacQuillen, and Bain.

The different committees met, and council resumed.

**Treasurer's Statement for Council**

House of Refuge Savings

The Council is required to raise in the present year the sum of \$1,618.80, to retire House of Refuge debenture maturing in December of this present year.

A bill was passed to postpone the sale of lands for taxes.

**Communication Committee Report.**  
The report of the Special Committee appointed to deal with communications was adopted as follows:—

Re communication from Live Stock Branch, Ontario Department, Toronto, for prizes to Winter Fair, that no action be taken.

That communication from Clark Moses, re typewriter, be referred to the whole Council.

That communication from Ontario Legislature, re maintenance of bridges, be taken up at a later meeting, and that in the meantime the members discuss it in their township councils and elsewhere.

That communication re grant to rural schools be referred to Finance Committee.

Communications re Conference of Charities and Convention at Guelph on June 22nd, 23rd and 24th: We recommend that the Master of the House of Refuge (Mr. Brown) be given and expenses paid.

The council resolved itself into a committee of the whole to take up the question of equalization and other matters, with Wm. MacQuillen in the chair, later resuming business.

**Committee of the Whole Report.**  
The report of the Committee of the Whole was adopted as follows:—

Sirs,—We beg to report that the equalization remain the same as in 1909, except the Village of Jarvis assessment be fixed at \$80,000, and the townships of Walpole, Rainham and Sherbrooke be fixed at \$40,000 per township.

That the revised assessment be published in the minutes.

That the Council do not buy typewriters for the officers at present applying for the same.

Roulston—Anderson—That Messrs. Pyle, Steiner, Parsons, Shaver, Young, Smith, Smelser and MacQuillen be a committee to frame a set of rules and regulations for the House of Refuge and county farm.—Carried.

**School Inspector's Report.**  
Gentlemen,—I have the honor to submit the following report on the condition of the Public Schools of the County of Haldimand for the year 1909.

All the schools of the county were visited by me twice, and on the whole I am well satisfied with the work of the year.

The teachers, with few exceptions, did the very best they could for the pupils under their charge and the schools of the county are, I am satisfied, making satisfactory progress.

Since the inception of the present regulations the improvement in equipment and accommodation has been very gratifying.

In the following School Sections, up-to-date school houses have been built:—Nos. 7, North Cayuga; 9, North Cayuga; 2, Oneida; 5, Oneida; 5, Sherbrooke; 9, Walpole; 21 Walpole.

These school houses comply with the regulations of the Education Department in every particular and are a credit to the respective School Sections and an object lesson to the surrounding country.

On an examination of the foregoing statement it would appear that the cost per pupil for Cayuga, N., Dunn, Oneida, and Sherbrooke is high when compared with the other townships of the County.

This is owing to the fact that new school houses have been built in the above named townships and a debenture in each matures yearly and must be taken up.

The total receipts for the year, including the balance in trustees' hands from 1908, were \$78,754.73.

The total expenditures were \$52,305.42, leaving a balance in the hands of the trustees in 1910 of \$26,449.31.

The amount paid teachers from all sources was \$26,449.31.

The foregoing statement of the regularity of attendance of each township. The Oneida shows the highest percentage of average attendance in the whole county. This is as high as any of the province, yet I do not have reached "high" level. Very much better results attained by concerted action of the trustees, parents.

The action of the township officers of the county in appointing officers will have a fact.

During the year, 99 employed in the rural schools of the county. Second-class, 44; Third-class, 55. For the past two years, officers of the county regularly qualified teachers of such throughout the county principally to two classes. The large number of Second-class teachers of long years to Manitoba and Alberta, owing ungenerous salaries received in the younger Canada.

2.—The passing of a Bill by the Legislature of Ontario for the purpose of limiting the salaries of rural school teachers and of Provincial Normal Schoolmen Second-class teachers. After June 30th, 1911, the salaries of such teachers should be limited to the same as that in securing proper teachers.

I think it prudent to discuss of the present system and licensing teaching system has been thoroughly discussed.
