

#### A FAMOUS HYMN.

"I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say." the finest and perhaps most loved of all Horatius Bonar's hymns, was written while the author was minister at Kelso. His son tells how that he would take his notebook, and while thinking out the line of his hymn, he would be busy with his pencil, making little sketches all over the margin of the page. It is evident from the manuscript that Dr. Bonar, like John Wesley, made use of a kind of shorthand, though in his case the signs employed bear a strong likeness to Pitman's system.

The original manuscript of "I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say" is now very much worn and faded. It is written in pencil, and the photographer who copied the original explains that he had to give an exposure of something like three-quarters of an hour in order

to get even a fairly good result.

Dr. Bonar's notebook, which is now one of the most precious relics he has left behind, contains, it is believed many other hymns, including "I Was a Wandering Sheep," written two or three years previous to "I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say," and that very beautiful resignation hymn, "Thy Way, Not Mine, O Lord," written in 1855.

#### NEW AUTO HOSE WAGON.

Worth Seeing as it Shrieks Its Way to a Fire.

There are plenty who think that the most stirring eight to be seen in the city's streets is the fire engine going to a fire, with horses galloping, whistle screaming, smoke streaming back from the smokestack above and sparks flying and dancing from the firebox below. Such people may think that when mo-tors shall have supplanted horses in the moving of fire apparatus the days of romance will have gone, but still the sight of the new automobile high pressure water tender 72 going to a fire, with siren shricking and bell clanging. makes something of a sensation and may even cause a thrill.

This new motor driven tender is bigger in every way than the horse drawn tenders, and its load of big, heavy high pressure hose, laid in it in fore and aft folds, stacks up to a height of seven feet or so above the ground. Three feet higher, running the length of the wagon along the middle, is a hand rail.

The crew numbers ten. The captain rides standing on a little platform at the forward right hand corner of the tender to the right of the chauffeur. the lieutenant rides standing on another little platform at the forward left hand corner, the engineer rides on the step at the rear, and the rest of the company ride standing on top of the load, holdng on by the hand rail.

You can hear the automobile tender's siren blocks away, with its wild rising and falling, sinking and swelling shrick; and then as it comes nearer you hear the clamor of its bell, and then the big tender, good for thirty miles an hour they say with a clear way, with the man at the wheel and the men standing up at front and rear and with that bunch of men standing high in the air on top and with bell a clanging and ery way to leather belts, steel bands. siren shricking, sweeps roaring by. You | chains, etc., and is much cheaper. The may miss the galloping horses and all that, but still the big horseless tender on the way to a fire is a sight to see.

In the tender's house the absence of horses makes all the difference in the world. No more the harness hanging up in front; no more the horses standing in their stalls, to jump and come tearing and plunging to the pole at the sound of the gong; no more the dropping of harness and snapping of collars around the horses' necks as the driver gathers up the lines; no more the eager digging of hoofs into the engine house floor as the horses buckle down to start their load; no more the sharp clatter as they start on their run. All gone.

Now the men come from their quarters down the sliding poles silently and swiftly, just as they have always done, to leap on the tender, and now where once a man snapped a horse's collar a man cranks the tender's motor; the chauffeur is already up.

All the eplendid tumult of the old time start is gone, but they say the motor tender gets away in about two seconds less time.—New York Sun.

"Aviation has to be learned, just like any other trade," declared Philip Hall, New York, a member of the Aero Club, of America, at the New Willard. Mr. Hall is building two aeroplanes, a biplane and a monoplane at his country place on Long Island.

"The first thing the aviator has to learn is whether the gasoline engine in the aeroplane, while in the air, working properly. He must learn to be able to detect this by sound alone. All parts of the engine have their particular noise, and when they are all working in harmony form the sound of the engine. A single false note shows the aeronaut immediately that something is wrong with the machinery. It is a peculiar thing that while the engine makes the same volume of noise on the ground as in the air, when flying the noise seems to be faint and far away to the aviator.

"Unexpected danger lurks everywhere in a flying aeroplane. The aviator must learn to judge air currents and most of all, he must have the steadiest kind of rerves, so that he can act instantly in a hundred possible emergen-

"I do not believe that aviation is going to become as common as autome ing, as some persons seem to think it will. The sport is much more expensive than automobiling, and far more gerous."—Washington Post.


