Horse Shipments.

Monday was a rather busy day at the station here in shipping horses, there being five carloads shipped. Frank Ross shipped two carloads to Swift Current, Sask; Ed. Eaid a carload to Joseph Owen at Winnipeg, Man.; James McClelland a carload to Loreburn, Sask., and W. W. Howell a carload to Loreburn and also a car of settler's effects. Horse buyers find it quite difficult to get good horses in this locality and it is no wonder as a great number have been shipped from here during the past few months.

Bowling Club.

Fatal Accident.

On Tuesday forenoon, March 15, Robert Luskie met instant death at the railway crossing a short distance west of Nelles Corners, by a special Wabash emigrant train striking his wagon. Mr. Luskie and two other parties had each taken a load of household effects to Nelles Corners for Martin Murphy who lives near Balmoral and were returning for another load when the accident happened. One man had driven across the track and tried to warn Mr. Luskie of the approaching train but could not make him hear. Just as the horses and front part of the wagon got on the track the engine struck the wagon, throwing Mr. Luskie about thirty-five feet when he landed on a pile of stone on his head, killing him instantly. The horses were both killed and the wagon smashed to splinters. Mr. Luskie's home was only a short distance from where the accident took place. He leaves a widow and seven children in poor circumstances, the oldest being fifteen years and the youngest six months.

The bride was very tastefully gowned and wore a pearl crescent brooch, the groom's favor to her. There were other beautiful and costly gifts of which the bride was the recipient.

After a social evening had been spent in games, music, etc. the happy couple drove over to the groom's handsome home at Sandusk, where their many friends wish them a long and happy life.

She was for some years leader of the choir, also held office in the ladies' aid, a popular friend of all the young people, and highly respected by the old, willing either to lead or follow in any cause whose object was to make this world better and brighter. Resolution of Walpole Council.

The following resolution was passed by the Walpole Council last Saturday, 12th inst.:—Moved by W. D. Roulston, seconded by S. G. Holbrook, Resolved, That whereas the Dominion and Provincial Governments have by an "Order in Council" commanded that all owners of dogs shall keep them securely chained in an outhouse or other building or kept under lock and key or efficiently muzzled with metallic muzzles, in a manner satisfactory to the Inspectors of the Department of Agriculture of the Dominion of Canada, and whereas we have been informed that there are a number of dogs running at large without muzzles. Therefore the Municipal Council of the Township of Walpole requests and urges upon all parties to carry out the above law, and, to see that it is properly enforced, as there are Inspectors appointed who may call unexpectedly upon these parties, who are not obeying the law, and not only cause the dogs to be destroyed but impose a very heavy penalty, which may be as high as \$200 for each offence.—Carried.

Village Council.

March 15, 1910.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members present—Messrs. Smith, Holmes, Burwash and Allen.

Mr. Murdoch reported to the council that he had waited on the Municipal Council of the township of Walpole with regard to the altered condition of School Section No. 10, by reason of the Village of Jarvis being incorporated and Walpole Council had forwarded a petition asking for a Union School Section to be arranged.

Moved by Messrs. Allen and Burwash, that By-Law No. 9 governing the petition of the rate-payers, asking for the establishment of a Union School Section to be known as Jarvis Public School, and also governing the signing of an agreement between this Municipality and the Municipality of Walpole in connection with the same, be read a first time.—Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Burwash and Allen, that said bill be read a second time.—Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Holmes and Burwash, that said by-law No. 9 be read a third time, be passed, signed and sealed and entitled as in the original motion.—Carried.

By-Law No. 10—To prevent the lighting and setting off firecrackers of any kind in the streets or public places, and to prevent the playing of baseball, football and cricket in the said streets was read a first, second and third time and was duly passed as in the original motion.

By-Law No. 11—To regulate the running at large of domestic animals in the streets and the impounding the same, was read a first, second and third time and was passed, signed and entitled as in the original motion.

Moved by Messrs. Holmes and Smith, that Councilors Burwash and Allen be a committee to wait on the Municipal Council of the township of Walpole to adjust the arrears of license monies also the assets belonging to said village.—Carried.
