### County Council Meets.

March 3, 1910.  
Morning Session.

The County Council met pursuant to adjournment. All the members were present. The minutes of the former meeting were read and adopted.

The following communications were read:

Jan. 24th Letter from George P. Brown.

March 3rd—Letter from Major Williamson.

Jan. 24th—Letter from J. S. Robertson.

Feb. 2nd—Letter from the Minister of Education.

Feb. 5th—Letter from Clerk of Legislature.

Feb. 5th—Letter from J. Kohler, M. P.

Feb. 8th—Letter from Clerk of Legislature.

Feb. 18th—Letter from Provincial Secretary.

Feb. 23rd—Letter from John E. Farewell.

Feb. 26th—Letter from Provincial Secretary.

The tenders for printing were referred to the Special Committee, composed of Pyle, MacQuillen, Bain, Smith, Secord and Root.

The following were appointed a committee to consider communications—Young, Cline, Smelser and Walton.

Afternoon Session.

The several committees met.

The report of the Special Committee appointed for printing was received and adopted as read:

Gentlemen,—We would recommend that the tender of the Caldonia Sackem for the printing for the year 1910 be accepted.

Wm. MacQuillen, Chairman.

The report of the special committee on communications was received and adopted as read:

Gentlemen,—We beg to report as follows:

That the usual grant of \$50 be given for beautifying the Court House grounds.

That we take no action re the National Sanitarium Association.

That letter re telephone poles on bridge be referred to the whole council.

That the applications for keeper of House of Refuge be referred to the whole council.

D. Young, Chairman.

Cline—alton—that Chas. Duncan of the Village of Cayuga be recommended to be appointed a county constable; that Sheriff McConnell be instructed to procure and supply him with a pair of handcuffs as soon as the appointment is made; that Judge Douglas be notified of the resolution, and that the said Charles Duncan be appointed at once. Carried.

Council formed itself into a committee of the whole to deal with the communications left for their consideration with J. J. Parsons in the chair, later resuming business and their report was received and adopted as read:

Gentlemen,—We beg to report as follows:

1—After considerable discussion on communications from the Bell Telephone Co., it was moved by Mr. Robertson, seconded by Mr. Smelser, and carried that we ask our solicitor to inform us of the reading of the Bell Telephone Company's charter referred to in Clause 3, No. 43, Chapter 67; that this subject be taken up at our next meeting, and that our solicitor then inform us of our legal standing, also if he deems it expedient he to consult with another lawyer.

2—It was also moved by Mr. MacQuillen, seconded by Mr. Smith, and carried that we advertise for a manager and matron for the County House of Refuge, and that the warden be instructed to call a special meeting of council on March 24th to consider applications for the above mentioned positions.

J. J. Parsons, Chairman.

Smith—Young—that the clerk be instructed to file in all county papers for applications for manager and matron for the House of Refuge, and that the applicants appear personally before the County Council on March 24th, 1910, also that Messrs. Roulston, Young and MacQuillen be a committee to assist the clerk in drawing up the advt. Carried.

A by-law was passed to pay County Councillors \$3.00 for committee work. This to repeal by-law 419.

The different committees again met.

March 4, 1910.  
Morning Session.

Shaver—Roulston—that the clerk be instructed to write the Victoria Industrial School, giving the names of persons for whose maintenance this county is paying, and ask for the following information:

1—The date of the admission of each.

2—The names of any (if any) who are not there now.

3—When such persons left the school.

4—Where each of such persons is.

5—What pay (if any) the school has received for the services of each of such persons.

6—By what authority such persons were put out to service.

7—By what authority the school retains the earnings of such persons without giving this county credit for the same, while it continues to collect from this county charges for maintenance for such persons.

8—How long a person committed to the school may be detained in the

school. Carried.

The reports of the different committees on inspection were received and adopted as read:

Gentlemen.—We your committee on House of Refuge investigation beg to report as follows:

The Report from Welland County.

Manager's salary ..... \$500.00 per year  
Matron's salary ..... 250.00 per year  
Manager's assistant ..... 225.00 per year  
Matron's assistant ..... 192.00 per year  
Farm has 60 acres, all mixed farming; 2 acres in fruit, 3 horses, 6 cows, 12 swine, 50 fowl.  
Cost of inmates per week, \$1.00 each.

Attendance on the sick is done by the manager and matron.

Meat supplied by tender, buying nothing but fore quarters.

All bread supplied by tender.

Number of inmates in home at present, 58. The home has been built 22 years.

Cost of maintenance per year, over and above self sustaining, \$3000.

Physician's salary, \$100 per year.

Minister visits home every Sunday, and his salary is \$50 per year.

They have a home committee composed of three members of the County Council, who have full charge of the Home, and the chairman of the said committee is known as the Inspector of the Home. They work in conjunction with the manager and matron. They visit the home every three months, and often if necessary.

Government Inspector visits once a year.

Wm. MacQuillen, Chairman.

The Report from Lincoln County.

Manager's salary ..... \$400.00  
Matron's salary ..... 250.00  
Manager's assistant ..... 224.00  
Matron's assistant ..... 180.00  
Farm has 72 acres; 20 acres in fruit, balance in mixed farming; 8 cows, 15 swine, 4 horses, 50 fowl.  
Cost of inmates per week, \$1.35.

Attendance on sick per week, \$10.

Meat supplied by tender, buying nothing but fore quarters.

All bread supplied by tender.

Number of inmates in Home at present, 47.

The Home has been built 24 years. Cost of maintenance over and above self sustaining, \$2000 per year.

All inmates compelled to take a bath once a week.

All inmates locked out of bed rooms during day time, except when sick.

Physician's salary, \$100 per year.

Minister visits Home every Sunday, and his salary is \$50 per year.

They have a Home Committee, composed of three members of the County Council, who have full charge of the home, and the chairman of the said committee is known as the Inspector of the Home, and they work in conjunction with the manager and matron.

The Report of Norfolk County.

Gentlemen.—We your committee to inspect the Norfolk County House of Refuge, which is located at Simcoe, beg leave to report as follows:

Three of the committee went to Simcoe on the evening of Feb. 10th, and by doing so had a whole day. I arrived on the noon train, and therefore had only the afternoon. On arriving at the House of Refuge we were very cordially welcomed by the master, matron and their three daughters. And I might say here that these people are masters of the situation in every sense of the word. The House is a large brick structure, built on a hill, which gives it a very good appearance. The interior is well ventilated, having high ceilings, plenty of window openings, and heated and lighted with natural gas. The rooms are neatly, but not elaborately furnished. The bedrooms, which hold from one to eight beds, are furnished with single iron beds, and your committee would recommend that if this council furnish with iron beds they be enamelled, as they give the room a very neat appearance. The beds are supplied with springs, straw ticks, blankets and white spreads. The living rooms are large, neatly furnished, and well lighted and ventilated. Both males and females have a day room. There are also two large dining rooms one for males and one for females. It has a large kitchen and pantry, store room, wash room, bathroom, dairy room, surgery room and drug room. There is also one large room, which is used as a church, where the different clergy from the town hold divine worship on Sundays.

The inmates, who at the time of our visit numbered 58, are all properly cared for, and well satisfied with the treatment handed out to them. These people are kept separate—each having their own apartments. One inmate has to bathe at least once a week, and have a change of clothing. The inmates—all those who are able—are supposed to help about the farm and home.

Besides the main building there is an isolation building, which is used for contagious diseases and lunatics. There is also a big hip roof barn, with shed and pig pen. The farm implements are all placed away, cleaned and oiled. The stock consists of pigs, two brood sows, ten shoats and eight fat pigs; one span of horses, which cost \$300, and are now worth \$600; 10 dairy cattle, which supply the home with milk and butter.

The farm is nicely situated, but the soil is very light sand, and needs good manure to make it produce a crop, but it is able under present management to supply enough fodder to feed the stock, and also vegetables and roots for the Home, which adds greatly to the credit of the master. The master, matron and daughters are very capable people. The master has charge of the farm; the matron and two of her daughters have charge of the Home. The master receives a salary of \$400 per year for his services, with an additional \$150 for hired help, if necessary. The matron receives \$200 per year, while the girls each receive \$3.00 per month.
