DEATH OF KING EDWARD.

London, May 7.—Edward, VII., King of Great Britain and Ireland and Emperor of India, died just before the new day began. The end came at Buckingham Palace at 11.45 o'clock last night.

The actual burial will take place on May 20th. The place of interment will be in St. George's Chapel, Windsor Castle.

The funeral, which was largely attended, was held on Tuesday afternoon, a short memorial service being held in the Methodist church.

The interment took place in Greenwood cemetery, Waterford.

St. Paul's Church.

The services last Sunday were befitting to the Empire's grief over the death of its Sovereign. On Saturday as soon as word came of King Edward's passing away the bell was tolled for more than half an hour, there being 68 strokes corresponding to the years of his Majesty's life. On Sunday special Psalms, hymns, prayers, Scripture lessons appropriate to the occasion were used. Canon Belt preached, in the morning taking as his text Ps. 72: 1. "Give the King Thy Judgments, O Lord, and Thy Righteousness to the King's Son." After reviewing the chief events of the late King's life briefly he spoke of the work done by King Edward who surpassed the high hopes which were held when he ascended the Throne, and proved himself a tactful Statesman in the politics of his own land, and a great influence for peace in the politics of the world. God had given him, in a marked degree, the spirit of judgment and he had exercised it for the good of his people. Two chief lessons stand out in his life (1) Loyalty to what he felt to be his duty, and (2) Consideration for the comfort and happiness of others. In the morning the hymn "Now the labourer's task is o'er" was sung after the sermon, and in the evening the National Anthem for the new King.

The Woman's Auxiliary met at Mrs. Hartwell's yesterday and heard reports of the annual meeting from Mrs. Campbell and Mrs. Lewis two of the delegates. The reports were very interesting and a vote of thanks was tendered the delegates. The Auxiliary will hold meetings on the last Tuesday of each month during the summer, and work will be done to the autumn bazaar.

Rev. Mr. Harnwell will give his lecture entitled "Who's Who, in My Trip to Europe," in the Methodist church on Friday night, May 13th, eight o'clock to which all are invited. Mr. Harnwell travelled over much of Europe as those who read his letters to the Record may remember. The lecture is spoken of as exceedingly interesting, humorous and entertaining. The lecture will be interspersed by solos and duets by best talent.
