A number of fast horses have already been entered for the running races, and as the prizes are good there is no doubt but that the running races will be the best held in the county for years. The other races and sports are sure to be well completed and a good day's sport is assured to all who spend Victoria Day in Jarvis. A grand concert will be held in the evening, when Will Hollinghead, the Canada's popular entertainer, will take the leading part, assisted by first-class music and other talent.

Memorial Service.

A very large congregation gathered in the Methodist church on Sunday evening to attend Divine service in memory of our late Sovereign, King Edward VII. Rev. H. J. Harnwell taking for his text "He removeth kings and setteth up kings." Dan 2: 21, which was listened to by a very attentive audience. Suitable music for the occasion was rendered by the choir. During the service Misses Maud and Mabel Parkinson sang a most appropriate selection entitled "The Nation's Song." Below is an outline of the sermon.

This is a public and national sorrow. It is the duty of all under the shelter of the half-masted Union Jack to pay their loyal respects to the memory of King Edward VII.

Early years of the King. Special education. Visit to Canada and United States. Back to college. Dash up to London. Trip to Holy Land.

Marriage to beautiful Danish Princess Alexandra 1863. Visited Egypt in 1869. Great public emotion caused by his illness of 1871. Goes to India in 1875 and becomes King of England 1901. Died May 6th, 1910.

The King's broad views the object of both censure and praise. Almost, if not altogether, the best loved ruler that ever sat upon a throne. More than even his mother he loved the big, old world and in everything he had a thought for its good. He died a martyr to his sense of duty.

God comfort the Queen Mother with His infinite grace. God give to our new King and his affectionate consort a people full of patriotism and of highest national ideals.
