We will refund to any patron the amount paid for one round trip railroad, steamboat or town within a radius of 10 miles of Hamilton whose purchases from the Right House shall amount in any one day to at least \$8.00.

The amount paid for one round trip fare by any patron of the Right House who comes from within a radius of 15 miles of Hamilton and whose purchases in any one day shall amount to at least \$12.50.

Any patron of the Right House who lives within 25 miles of Hamilton will have his or her round trip railroad, steamboat, or trolley fare refunded on purchasing from The Right House in any one day merchandise amounting to £20.00.00.

The amount paid for one round trip, railroad, steamboat, or trolley fare from any city or town within a radius of thirty-five miles of Hamilton will be refunded to each individual whose purchases from The Right House shall amount to at least the sum of \$25.00 in any one day.

A round trip fare will likewise be refunded to any person who comes from a point within forty-five miles and more than thirty-five miles of Hamilton, whose total purchases at The Right House amount to at least \$35.00.

There will be room for about fifty occupants, and if necessary ten more rooms can be added by partitioning off the top part of the building. It will be an up-to-date Home, with all the modern conveniences—electric and gas lighting, water service, fire protection, etc. A part of the farm is planted with peas, which will be followed by wheat this season, and the balance of the land will be utilized with the object of making the property self-sustaining as nearly as possible. Although the occupants will live a simple life, it will be a relief from many worries, trials and tribulations, heretofore passed in the daily grind trying to make ends meet. They will live in a model and comfortable home, far removed from those described in Dickens, under the management of a humane and kind-hearted manager and his worthy wife.
